I. Course Description

Presents the theory and practice of experimental media while focusing on innovative works by artists, for whom film and video is an art form allied to experimental narrative. Develops conceptual practices in developing media experiments embedded with meaning. Propels students towards the production of a series of experimental creative projects.

II. Introduction

What is experimental media? Think of a science course where an experiment morphs matter and shape shifts familiar elements into something else. Can you do that with audiovisual tools? This class is quite literally about experimenting with media...

III. Required Texts and Materials

Various articles posted in the attached reading list (all are free through library search); <u>I am Malala</u>, novel by Malala Yousafzai (copies are also on reserve in the library); Sketchbook and drawing materials of your choice (bring to each class).

IV. Course Learning Objectives and High Impact Practices

Upon successful completion of the course, students should be able to:

- Apply experimental techniques in HD recording and delivery devices and solve technical problems as they arise;
- Identify and adapt HD media to different technologies and contexts;
- Develop and create a video and audio project that conveys meaning.
 - High Impact Practices (HIPs) in this course include collaborative projects and participation in the campus wide Common Read initiative.

V. Course Requirements

Students will be evaluated based on participation and on individual and collaborative projects. The way for you to log your participation is to attend class. Online documentation of your work – through your media experiment log and your project progress posts – is mandatory and makes up a significant portion of your grade. Students are expected to spend a minimum of two hours outside of the classroom each week for each unit of credit engaged in learning, so budget at least six hours of week outside of class time for reading and projects.

California State University San Marcos has established a 2500-word minimum writing requirement for each course (10 pages). There is writing assistance for students at the Writing Center (750-4168.) The writing requirement for this class is fulfilled by project progress posts, the article assessment, and the project statement.

Graded assignments include media experiments, entries in the readings forum, article assessment and presentation, and final project and statement. You can access your grades using Cougar Courses. Please note that mid-semester grades are unofficial.

IX. Student Collaboration

The third media experiment assignment is a group project and will require collaboration. Students will be required to meet outside of class time with their group members. While other assignments do not mandate collaborating, students can propose working together.

Students are expected to adhere to standards of academic honesty and integrity, as outlined in the Student Academic Honesty Policy. All assignments must be original work. All ideas/material that are borrowed from other sources must have appropriate references to the original sources. The instructor reserves the right to discipline any student for academic dishonesty, in accordance with the general rules and regulations of the university.
