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The History of Tukwut at CSUSM

In 1990 the first class of students at CSUSM approached me, knowing I'd been doing work in the local tribal communities, and asked if I could find out the Luiseño language words for mountain lion and pioneer. They were looking to name their first yearbook, using a Luiseño name, with the expressed interest of honoring the indigenous people on whose ancestral lands the new university was soon to be built.

At the time, I was working with Mark Macarro (now Tribal Chairman at Pechanga) at the Rincon Tribal Library who was doing oral history work with Villiana Hyde, one of the few remaining Luiseño elders with any degree of fluency in the language and author of <u>An Introduction to the Luiseño Language</u> (1971).

Mark went to Villiana with the CSUSM student request and came back with the two words, given as a 'gift' to the new university. The students selected Tukwut, the word for mountain lion. Their first yearbook was named Tukwut and the name was unofficially adopted as the mascot word, since mountain lion images were already on everything from t-shirts to coffee mugs.

Tukwut remained the unofficial mascot until 1998 when a reporter for the Union Tribune added a "linguistic footnote" at the end of an article on the emerging golf program. Quote: "...the school nickname, the Tukwuts, may be dropped for something with more ring than the Luiseño word for mountain lion." Members of the Luiseno community were offended, of course. Later that year the University Image Task Force was formed and asked for campus-wide input on campus colors, mascot, etc.

Faculty response overwhelmingly supported the idea of keeping the word and educating the campus community on its pronunciation and meaning. Student editorials in the Pride were equally supportive of retaining the word.

An election was held in April, 1999 so that students could vote on the mascot name – but Tukwut was removed from the ballot.

In the summer of 2000, an editorial appeared in the *Union Tribune*, praising the recent WASC accreditation. The editor notes "students even approved changing the school's nickname from the archaic 'Tukwuts' (a Luiseño word for mountain lion) to the more prosaic 'cougars.'"

Over the years, student groups got wind of the history of Tukwut at Cal State San Marcos and various initiatives popped up. Controversy stirred up in 2002 when a campus official argued in a Pride editorial that Tukwut was not official or unofficial – even though it was listed in the official campus document, Graphic Standards. As Vice Chair for the Academic Senate, I presented a 'history lesson' on Tukwut to President's Council in November of 2002.

For 17 years, Tukwut came and went and came again. Thanks to keen student leadership and effective advocacy, the Tukwut Courtyard (3rd floor outdoor area of Craven Hall) was dedicated in the spring of 2007. Numerous Luiseno leaders and educators were in attendance. Once again, CSUSM publicly honored the indigenous inhabitants of the land occupied by the university. Open wounds began to close.

Needless to say, I was thrilled when I received my first retiree's newsletter. Tukwut Times, indeed!



Member Profile - Steve Wiener

While I was working as a media tech at Tri-City Medical Center, I attended CSUSM Arts & Lecture events (and met my future supervisor, Bonnie Biggs) and offered equipment consultation via phone to Library Dean Marion Reid. When the Library obtained approval to recruit a media tech, Marion had Cate Boyce notify me so I could submit my application, which I did in July, 1992. That September, Tri-City laid off a dozen employees, including me, with only four hours' notice. I returned to my office to find a phone message: Call Deborah Coronado, CSUSM H.R. When I called, she told me that I had an interview with a committee and Dean Reid the next morning. Perfect timing!

I became the first Library employee to move onto campus in October, 1992. The library opened in early 1993. My duties included delivering media equipment carts to classrooms and conference rooms for faculty, students, and staff. This frequently involved 64 deliveries and pickups per class each semester! I had a staff of student assistants--up to 10. Frequently having international student workers made my job more fun and interesting. We trained dozens of faculty and staff on new classroom technology as it evolved.

My other major assignment was to run the Media Library. I was in charge of recommending media equipment to buy and rent as well as getting contract bids for installations. As one of two campus photographers, I had opportunity to do aerial photography in a sheriff's helicopter. That was fun and exciting, especially with no door and banked turns! Finally, I was the main sound engineer for special events on campus. Meeting great musicians and scholars were special treats for me.

In 2000, I transferred to IITS as a Media Production Specialist in charge of the satellite system and video conferences. I gave guest lectures for faculty who invited me. My subjects were very diverse: Films and Censorship; the Grateful Dead; Amnesty International, and Pro

Wrestling (8 times for John Schneider in Sociology!). I befriended numerous staff and faculty and even married and divorced a professor.

From 1995 to retirement, I was active in the staff union, CSUEU, serving as steward, vice president, and president. It was a very rewarding experience to help coworkers with grievances, promotions, transfers, and benefits.

At the end of 2013, I took early retirement, thanks to my parents' inheritance, my purchase of 3 years' service credit (with an IRA), and PERS. I've already traveled to Ecuador, Spain, Denmark, Arizona (twice), Virginia, D.C., and Maryland. This summer, I'll return to Spain (Barcelona this time) and Denmark.

I'm a volunteer at the Vista Library and the Vista Boys & Girls Club. I tutor elementary school students (a few learning English) and also play sports and games. I swim three times a week and enjoy occasional hikes. I also volunteer with my local Amnesty International chapter twice a month. And I still attend some Cougar sports events.

I feel extremely lucky to have worked at CSUSM for its first 21 years at the campus site and witnessed its successful growth and to have worked with and met so many wonderful people.

The Power Surge Café



Mark Dubois and his company Café Catering have been providing delicious fare at CSUSM events for several years. At some point most of us involved with the campus have been to a reception or a meeting where we sampled Mark's creative and varied dishes. But we bet there are many interesting facts about Mark that most of you may not know: He is a CSUSM alumnus who majored in Spanish. Café Catering had its start as the Power Surge Café across from campus.

Mark came from back east and brought a unique sensitivity to our mostly local student body. From the first he envisioned the need for a typical campus hangout desperately missing from the immediate area. After graduating in 1996, along with some partners, Mark conceived a cyber café in a stand-alone building on Barham Drive. As a mentor and friend, I listened to Mark and, aware of the bureaucracy and our commuter student body, was apprehensive but did not dissuade him. Soon after, he proved me wrong and opened the Power Surge, our first off-campus coffee shop. Although not a cyber café after all, the Power Surge was a home away from campus for all of us wanting to get variety from the offerings at the Dome. Mark's sandwiches and salads were an instant hit. A unique concoction called the Cold Fusion, sparks nostalgic comments from our colleague Brooks Reid.

Besides eating meals there, campus groups started to have functions such as meetings, birthday parties and baby showers. Mark never charged for the venue. He soon started catering lunches and food for meetings and receptions.

Despite its success, the Power Surge lasted only a few years. When asked about its closing, Mark explains that many issues factored in his decision to move on to catering. We all speculated about the proliferation of competitors on and near campus and issues with the parking lot contract renewal with the city of San Marcos. Mark, however, sees it as all positive, having prospered with Café Catering which now counts 10 permanent employees and has served anywhere from 10 to 600 people in a variety of functions. He is, as most of us on campus are aware, a constant presence. On graduation week, for example, Café Caterers has worked up to eight receptions or dinners in one day. Despite working relentlessly, Mark, who is the sole owner, is happy where he is and credits many people at CSUSM, in particular former President Alex González, for opening the door to his catering on campus. He has very fond memories of being a student and cited several of his favorite faculty (I won't mention any names but they know who they are) who remain his friends. He also recalls his days as the owner of the Power Surge with affection but admits that running a café is a difficult way to make a living. Nevertheless, he is happy that, although it had a short life, the Power Surge is lives in our memories, in these days of one Starbucks after the other, as our original café.
