Accolades

Carol Cujec will receive an award for Outstanding Contribution to Juvenile Fiction from the Children's Literature Council of Southern California for her middle-grade novel *REAL*. Co-authored with Peyton Goddard, a nonspeaking autistic writer and advocate, the story illustrates the magic that happens when all people are valued and included.

Michelle A. Holling (Department of Communication) is the recipient of the Outstanding Article Award for her publication entitled "Intersectionalities in the Fields of Chicana Feminism: Pursuing Decolonization through Xicanisma's 'Resurrection of the Dreamers'." The award is from the National Communication Association's Feminist Gender Studies Division, which she will receive on November 18, 2022.

Suzanna Krivulskaya (History) has been named as a fellow by the Public Religion Research Institute, a nonprofit, nonpartisan research organization based in Washington, D.C.

Konane Martinez (Anthropology) has been appointed as the new faculty director of the National Latino Research Center.

Michael McDuffie, Philosophy, has been appointed to serve a three-year term as one of two non-physician Public Representatives to the national Hospice and Palliative Medicine Advisory Committee, for the American Board of Internal Medicine. The HPMAC functions as the subspecialty board for hospice and palliative medicine, overseeing board certification examinations and maintenance of certification for all hospice and palliative care physicians, nationwide.

Gloria Pindi's publication, "Promoting African knowledge in communication studies: African feminisms as critical decolonial praxis", has won the OSCLG Anita Taylor Outstanding Published Article or Chapter Award for 2022.

Updates

In October, **Martha Stoddard Holmes** (LTWR) co-led a seminar on "Disabling Victorian Studies" at the North American Victorian Studies Association Conference at Lehigh University. Participants explored how systemic assumptions about disability structure Victorianist practice and how a cripstemological perspective might complement initiatives to undiscipline and decolonize Victorian studies scholarship and classrooms.

Joely Proudfit, chair of the American Indian Studies department is serving as a consultant for [Spirit Rangers](#), a Native-themed, animated children's show that debuted on Netflix in October.

Tangible/Nothing opened September 8th at the Ruby City art venue in San Antonio, Texas. This exhibition features approximately 50 works by national and international artists exploring how the invisible or the seemingly mundane can reveal great meaning. Tangible/Nothing remains on view until July 30, 2023 and includes AMD Professor David Avalos' "Bullet-Proof Piñata" sculpture.
