




2011 New Journeys in CollaborationA California Tribal Museum Partnership Summit Thursday, November 17, 2011 Clarke Field House

Nicole Myers-Lim, J.D., (Pomo) Staff Attorney, National Indian Justice Center, returns to present on a little known era of sport history. The Carlisle Indian School football team, coached by Glenn Scobey "Pop" Warner along with Olympic champion Jim Thorpe and other team members, invented modern football. They pioneered the forward pass, the overhand spiral and other tactics that transformed the way in which the sport is played. Ms. Myers-Lim will discuss the important contributions these legendary players made in changing both the game of football and federal Indian policy.
