  - AB 1456 (Medina)-Student financial aid: Cal Grant Reform Act
    - This bill would shift the Cal Grant program to a model based on student need rather than things like age and time out of high school.
  - AB 928 (Berman) Student Transfer Achievement Reform Act of 2021
    - simplifies the transfer process by eliminating significant points of confusion, establishing state-level accountability for improved transfer rates, and ensuring more accessible re entry points to higher education.
