MLS Alumnus Awarded With Oceanside Teacher of the Year Award

Luis Casillas, a CSUSM alumnus in Modern Language Studies, was recently honored as Oceanside Unified School District Teacher of the Year. A Spanish teacher at César Chávez Middle School, he is one of only a few teachers in the state to teach AP Spanish to eighth grade students. Since his first class took the test in 2022, 65 percent of his students scored a 3 or higher. In 2023, 80 percent of his students scored a 3 or higher on the exam.

And when, during her first year at CSUSM, she decided to display student art in that space, sure enough, it was Bricke's art that was chosen. In January, the art created by Bricke the student was removed from Neufeldt's home gallery. In its place was installed art by two current or recent CSUSM students that was selected by Bricke, now a professional artist and curator.
