Martinez Heads Grant to Boost Latino Health

The National Latino Research Center (NLRC) has been awarded a \$333,332 grant from the federal Minority Research Grant Program to support the research of

Bridges2Health, a community health advocate program. The importance of the grant was recognized during a press conference in Vista on Oct. 6 by Mike Levin, who represents the 49th congressional district that includes much of North County, and U.S. Department of Health and Human Services Secretary Xavier Becerra. Dr. Konane Martinez, director of the NLRC and an anthropology professor, spoke at the press conference to discuss the impact that the grant will have on Latinx communities.

Psychology Professor Published on Ancestry Tests, Racial Tolerance

Psychology Professor Sasha Kimel has been published by the Journal of Experimental Psychology: Applied, an American Psychological Association publication. Kimel's article, titled "Finding Your Roots: Do DNA Ancestry Tests Increase Racial (In)Tolerance?", focuses on understanding if an individual's opinions of other racial and ethnic groups can be impacted by the results of their own DNA ancestry test. Essentially, the goal of Kimel's research and experiment was to understand the effect of knowing how genetically similar or different you are to someone.



Steinway Hall of Fame Inducts Music Professor Cheng

Music Professor and Department Chair Ching-Ming Cheng was recently inducted into the Steinway & Sons Teacher Hall of Fame. Cheng, who joined CSUSM's faculty in 2011, played an integral role in the university becoming an All-Steinway School, a prestigious designation held by fewer than 200 colleges, universities and conservatories worldwide. She has received Steinway's Top Music Teacher Award every year since 2016.
