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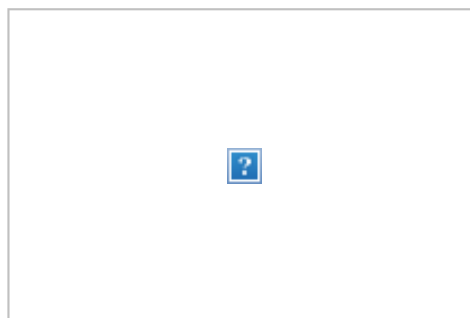

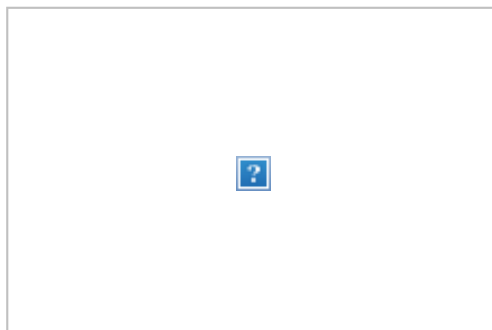
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California Indian Day

Speaker, Cultural Educator and Mentor, Mr. Stan Rodriguez (Iipay Nation of Santa Ysabel) to the CSUSM screening of "First People - Kumeyaay".

The event began with introductions from the Director of the CICSC Joely Proudfit, Ph.D. (Luiseño) and Theresa Gregor, Ph.D. (Kumeyaay) who were ecstatic and privileged to present the film for California Indian Day. We were overjoyed to have an influential member of the Native community in attendance.

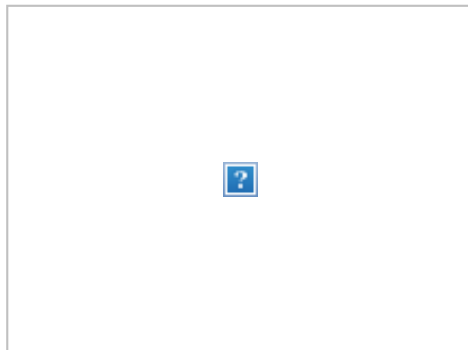

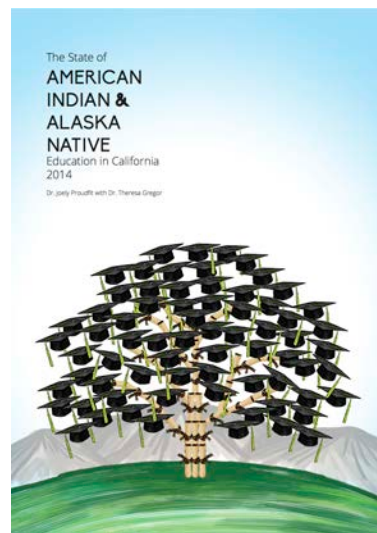

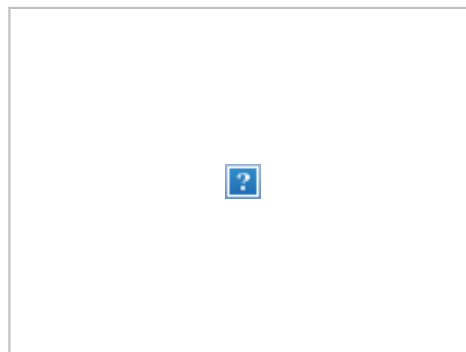
