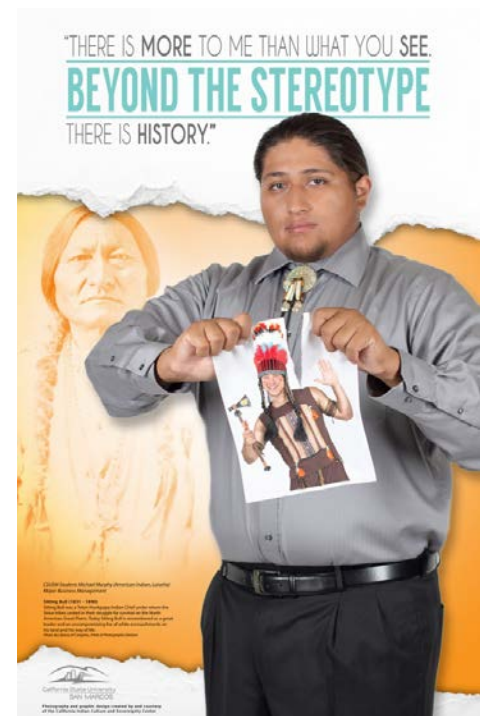

PL-280 Course at Fantasy Springs Resort Casino

June 17th-18th, 2015

On June 17-18, the CICSC Law Enforcement Certificate Program presented *Understanding Jurisdiction on Tribal Lands: A User-Friendly PL-280 Course*. *This 2-day class was generously supported by the Four Winds Tribal Coalition and Verizon Foundation. It took place at the Fantasy Springs Resort Casino Event Center in Indio, CA.



The Torres-Martinez Desert Cahuilla Indians used the training to benefit many of the individuals who serve the Tribe in leadership positions. The Augustine Band of Cahuilla Indians also sent several participants. Instructors covered important topics, such as, tribal sovereignty, domestic violence and tribal protection orders, the evolution of criminal jurisdiction on tribal lands, public safety issues and practical understanding of the federal mandate for state criminal jurisdiction on tribal lands (PL 83-280). Feedback from the class showed that everyone gained something important from the training -- some even said it exceeded their expectations!

**This course is a result of years in formulating a collaboration with the California Commission on Peace Officer Standards and Training (POST). Through this collaboration, the Center offers a 2-day course to active peace officers in the State of California about the unique jurisdiction on tribal lands that can be applied to their POST certificates. Additionally, these peace officers, and all other participants, receive a Certificate of Completions from the center.*

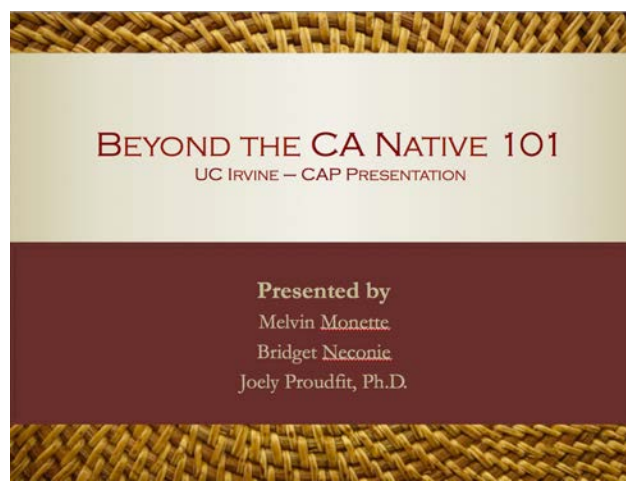

2015 College and Preparation (CAP) Forum

Wednesday, June 17th, 2015

Dr. Joely Proudfit joined Melvin Monette, President of the National Indian Education Association (NIEA) and Bridget Neconie, Assistant Director of the Office of Undergraduate Admission at UC Berkeley for the panel *Beyond the California Native 101* at the 2015 CAP Forum held at UC Irvine. Mr. Monette presented on NIEA and other national work being done in American Indian higher education. Dr. Proudfit presented on the State of AIAN Education in



California report results including information on the CSU and UC systems. Ms. Neconie presented on the American Indian Counselor Recruiters Association and provide information on enrollment. The annual CAP forum brings together educators and practitioners who work throughout academia to improve academic preparation and access

for underserved communities.

NEXTus: Indigenous Media Arts Festivals Summit

June 23rd-25th, 2015

Dr. Joely Proudfit in addition to being the Director of the CICSC, she is the Director of the San Diego American Indian Film Festival (SDAIFF). As the SDAIFF Director, Dr. Proudfit was invited to the NEXTus: Indigenous Media Arts Festival Summit in Mnjikaning, the Chippewas of Rama First Nation, one hour north of Toronto. The NEXTus summit was made possible through funding from the Canada Council for the Arts' Initiatives. ImagineNATIVE hosted the summit to bring together the leaders of Indigenous media arts festivals and Indigenous-specific sections of larger festivals. Dr. Proudfit was able to meet with other film festival directors to discuss relevant issues, challenges and opportunities. We look forward to implementing new ideas and suggestions in our upcoming annual San Diego American Indian Film Festival.



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
