President Obama Names CSUSM Professor to National Advisory Council on Indian Education

On Friday, Feb. 19, President Barack Obama named California State University San Marcos Associate Professor Joely Proudfit, Ph.D., to the National Advisory Council on Indian Education.

"I am honored that these talented individuals have decided to serve our country," said President Obama. "They bring their years of experience and expertise to the Administration, and I look forward

to working with them."

Proudfit, Chair of the Department of American Indian Studies and director of the California Indian Culture and Sovereignty Center at CSUSM, will serve on the council, which was established under the Indian Education Act of 1972. The council is tasked with advising the Secretary of Education and Congress on the administration and funding of Alaska Native and American Indian education programs.

"We are very proud of Dr. Proudfit's appointment to the National Advisory Council on Indian Education," said CSUSM President Karen Haynes. "She has been a

champion educator and scholar. Her research and work have been integral to our university's efforts to address the serious challenges facing American Indian students, and we are proud to have the highest per-capita number, and the only increasing number, of American Indian students in the 23-campus CSU system. Furthermore, her work as the founding director of the California Indian Culture and Sovereignty Center, in collaboration with our Tribal Liaison, has nurtured transformational relationships with tribal partners in our efforts to increase the educational access and success of American Indian students in our region."

In his announcement on Friday, President Obama appointed six other individuals to key Administration posts, including:

- David Benton - Member, Arctic Research Commission
- Phyliss J. Anderson - Member, National Advisory Council on Indian Education
- Mandy Broaddus - Member, National Advisory Council on Indian Education
- Dahkota Kicking Bear Brown - Member, National Advisory Council on Indian Education
- Robert O. Carr - Member, National Infrastructure Advisory Council
- Keith T. Parker - Member, National Infrastructure Advisory Council

"I am honored to accept President Obama's appointment to the National Advisory Council on Indian Education," said Proudfit. "California is home to more than 110 American Indian tribes and thousands of American Indian/Alaska Native youth and it is time to acknowledge the daunting challenges facing them as we preserve our heritage and honor our traditions through commitments to the cultural values-responsibility, reciprocity, respect and relationships- that define us."

The CICSC was awarded a grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities to convene regional faculty and tribal communities in conversations to

support the development of an American Indian Studies major. Over the next eighteen months, the Center will host conversations on the creation of a 21st Century model American Indian Studies program. Beginning in April 2016, participants will engage in workshops around themes such as colonization, interpretation of cultures, changes in race, class and identity, language revitalization, stabilization and repatriation, language policies and politics, stereotypes, the controversies of writing Indian history, the politics of naming, decolonization, and activism and passivism. Devon Mihesuah, the University of Kansas' Core Lee Beers Price Endowed Professor, will join Patricia Dixon and Stan Rodriguez as discussants.

There were fifty individuals, representing a diverse combination of tribal and

state public safety and service provider entities, from various locations throughout Southern California. This diversity allowed for participants to gain much from each other. Many in the class commented on how they learned a lot from the experience of others in the class, which added value to the whole presentation. There was no lack of interaction and engagement between this lively group during the breakout groups and during the scenarios.

Participants left feeling inspired to move forward in their individual work. Many expressed appreciation for the training's user-friendly format and having a resource guide (included in the tuition) for a ready reference. All attendees received a Certificate of Completion from the California Indian Culture & Sovereignty Center (CICSC), and those from California agencies that are eligible.
