Dr. Spieldenner earned his Ph.D. in Communication and Culture from Howard University in 2009, thereafter became Assistant Professor at Hofstra in 2012. His expertise is in Health Communication, Intercultural Communication, and Cultural Studies. He brings a wealth of experience from his work in community health positions, including the National Association of People with AIDS, the NYC Health Media and Marketing Group, and the Office of Gay and Lesbian Health in New York City.

Dr. Spieldenner examines issues of culture and the body in three primary areas: HIV, the LGBT community, and the public sphere. He is particularly interested in health stigma and communities of color. His research speaks to academics and community-based practitioners. He has a variety of publications including articles in the *Journal of Homosexuality* and the *Californian Journal of Health Promotion*. He won the 2016 Teacher of the Year at Hofstra and is committed to teaching his students to think deeply about health communication and culture.

New Faculty Hire in Media Studies: Dr. Brian Dolber

During the spring semester, the media law and policy search committee, composed of myself, Drs. Katherine Brown and Anne Lombard (History), completed a successful hire. The committee is very pleased to announce that Dr. Brian Dolber will join the Department of Communication beginning in fall 2017!

Dr. Dolber earned his doctorate degree in Communication at the University of Illinois, Urbana-Champaign. His scholarly expertise includes the history of U.S. media and telecommunication policy as these relate to the political economy of the media, media activism and social movements, and ideologies and discourses of technology and media. He recently published his book *Media and Culture in the U.S. Jewish Labor Movement: Sweating for Democracy in the Interwar Era* in which he discusses the Jewish press and radio and its relationship to American labor movements from 1920 to 1940. His current research further investigates the

ways in which ideologies of technology are shaping the regulation of app-based "sharing economy" companies such as Uber and AirBnB. Dr. Dolber's teaching interests include the political economy and history of the media, the media and contemporary political culture, U.S. working-class history, and media activism.

Farewell & Well Wishes Dr. Rossmann

After 19 years of service, delivery of 64 courses, supervising 12 independent studies, one book, five journal articles, one book chapter, a book review, many presentations, as well as service to the department, College, University, and discipline, Dr. Liliana Castañeda Rossmann will retire at the end of the academic year. Although the list of her teaching, research, and service reflects her contributions to CSUSM, the list cannot capture the indelible mark she leaves on students and colleagues. Some colleagues in the department noted that Dr. Rossmann is "a mentor, ally, and trusted advisor"; "kindhearted and authentic"; "a positive person"; "cheerful"; and maintains "appreciative inquiry."

Over the years, Dr. Rossmann developed a few courses in her specialty area that have played a central role in teaching students skills necessary to cultivating collaborative and dialogic relationships. In particular, the sequence of courses—COMM 320, Conflict and

Communication; COMM 425, Communication and Mediation; and COMM 426, Dialogic Communication—figure prominently in such an endeavor. In terms of scholarly contributions, she is most proud of the publication of her book *Transcending Gangs: Latinas Story Their Experience* (2013). In addition, she identifies the founding of a Lambda Pi Eta chapter in the department, an honors society for students in the discipline of communication; and creation of COMM *Uniqué* and Media and Communication (MaC) Days as noteworthy accomplishments. The continuation of each is lasting mark of her legacy.

As she reflects on what she will miss, Dr. Rossmann highlighted "the intellectual home I have been able to create will be sorely missed. The passionate way students engage with the material in the various courses I teach; the support of my colleagues, especially during the commute, and the impromptu hallway chats." She looks forward to "reading, reading, reading. . . . sending my son off to the university in Germany; spending time with my daughter and husband; finishing my manuscript on Mexico's drug violence" and acquiring new hobbies and skills. On behalf of the department, we will miss Dr. Rossmann's presence. As she says "Adelante!"

MaC Day: Better Practices to Seeking Civility with Catherine Mattice

The Communication Department celebrated the sixth annual Media and Communication (MaC) Day on April 19, 2017, featuring guest speaker Catherine Mattice. In prior years, the department hosted an array of events along with Palomar College and Mira Costa featuring alumni panels, student-scholar research panels, and a keynote address. Dr. Liliana Castañeda Rossmann initiated MaC Days six years ago and, this year, Dr. Kendra Rivera coordinated the event including a workshop entitled "Conversations that Matter: Seeking Civility? What Workplace

is and How to Stand Up For Yourself" and a "Transforming from keynote address, Bystander to Upstander: How to Step in and Create a Better Environment when there's Bullying in Your Workplace," both of which the Department, Communication Society and CSU San Marcos Civility co-sponsored. Many faculty, staff, students attended both events and learned how to better handle situations that may arise where workplace bullying occurs. Workplace bullying impacts almost all workers in the U.S., whether directly or indirectly, by witnessing bullying. Through her keynote and workshop, Catherine Mattice expressed ways to combat bullying in order to create a healthy work environment for companies and workplaces as a whole.

As the keynote speaker and workshop facilitator, Catherine Mattice began studying workplace bullying during her graduate studies at San Diego State and continued her curiosity on the topic after graduation. She is a nationally acclaimed author and expert in And intervening in workplace bullying. Catherine is President of the consulting and training firm Civility Partners, and Founder and President of the National Workplace Bullying Coalition. She takes a holistic and strategic approach to ending workplace bullying with her clients. Her firm Civility Partners has worked with such clients as the American Red Cross and Kaiser Permanente, along with various universities in southern California. Her experience in the field allowed for engaging presentations.

Catherine's workshop defined and described workplace bullying and provided several actionable tips for standing up to "the bully." She explained how workplace bullying is "repeated, ongoing pervasive behaviors, generally how workplace bullying is "repeated, ongoing pervasive behaviors, generally happening over time which creates a psychological power imbalance." In the latter part of the day, Catherine delivered a keynote presentation during which she offered tips to inspire those affected by workplace bullying to be able to stand up for themselves and others. Her tips included "validating the other individual," "describing the problem and consequences," and "offering a solution." When validating Catherine the other individual, encouraged

encouraged finding a common ground, such as a mutual time crunch, upcoming holidays, and empathizing with "the bully." The second step focuses on the "up-stander," a term she prefers to empower those who witness bullying to step up and become involved. As such she encourages individuals to give specifics to problematic situations in the workplace. In the final step, when offering a solution, she encouraged phrases like "in the future..." in order to speak up for oneself. Attendees are now better equipped with methods to stand up for themselves and others in workplace bullying situations. Dr. Rivera believes as Catherine Mattice's presentations pointed out, "the impact of workplace bullying on the 'bottom line' for organizations has been demonstrated through research time and again. Bullying at work is bad for business and it's really

bad for employees. What I particularly enjoyed about Catherine's approach, is that she leverages the power of communication to try to put a stop to bullying by empowering both the target and the potential 'bystanders.' Indeed, we can all learn more about how to approach this challenging issue, and become part of the solution by speaking out against workplace bullying when we see it."

Catching up with Recent Alumni & the Value of Their B.A Degrees

As an undergraduate Communication or Mass Media major, the very thought of graduating can be extremely intimidating knowing that there is such versatility in potential jobs after graduation. Majoring in either degree may lead to job opportunities in a variety of fields from business, public relations, advertising, media, non-profits, governmental jobs, law, or higher education. The Career Center believes the degree of communication is "good preparation for graduate school in many disciplines including, law, education, business and public administration." Also, the Career Center notes that students in the majors will develop "strong written and verbal communication skills and excellent interpersonal skills." In order to have a better understanding of career possibilities after graduation, I reached out to a few recent alumni and faculty to get their insight on what they think is impactful about being a Communication or a Mass Media major. In what follows, benefits of COMM 445 as preparation for the "next steps after college" and updates about recent graduates Carlynn Whitton (2016), Donovan Johnson (2016) and Kaylie Sadlon (2016) are presented.

Dr. Katherine Brown teaches COMM 445, Communication Portfolio, and believes that her class helps students implement what they have learned in their undergraduate studies to potential job opportunities. As an undergraduate student, Dr. Brown started to think of a class that would help prepare students for the "the next steps after college." She refined the idea as a graduate student, by then she had "seen a lot of unevenness in preparation for and guidance to students who were going into different kinds of careers." At CSUSM, she conceived and developed the course to help undergraduates with different levels of experience fine tune their writing, presentation, and personal and group collaboration skills. Her course provides practical and learning components. In COMM 445 students prepare individual resumes; draft cover letters to showcase their skills, experiences, and abilities as Communication majors; practice different genres of professional writing such as letters, memos, or proposals; read, edit, improve, and evaluate these documents as communication professionals; write and give presentations; practice interviewing; and ultimately, better understand how to communicate in a variety of professional settings. Communication majors all have different professional backgrounds, some students with lots of internship experiences where others have minimal. If students have professional work experience the course will benefit them taking their experience to the next level. For students who have limited experience, they can use the course to learn where to begin in preparation for the "real world." Dr. Brown will teach COMM 445 in spring 2018 and eagerly awaits engaging with her students. For Mass Media majors, a similar class exists as ID 401, Career Readiness, and will be taught in the coming semesters.

Carlynn Whitton graduated December 2016 with a B.A. in Communication. She currently works as the Communication Coordinator at the Tony Hawk Foundation (THF), where she has been employed for the past five years. Her career began as an intern doing event planning. The foundation saw her interest in social media, then tailored a new position for her once she obtained her B.A. With her new position as Communication Coordinator, she deals primarily with all communications associated with the public. She applies her skills to the THF's social media, communications with public, and public and donor relations. Some of her favorite courses she sees implemented in her work at THF are COMM 401,

Donovan Johnson is another recent alumni interviewed. He graduated spring of 2016 with a B.A. in Mass Media. He recently became a Recruitment Specialist at American Mobile Healthcare. At his job, he helps traveling recruit nurses to fill assignments nationwide in the medical industry. His job entails a lot of multitasking and recruiting. Some of his favorite classes that he sees implemented in his career are COMM 402. Approaches to Rhetorical Criticism; MASS 365, New Media and Everyday Life; and MASS 460, Political Economy of Mass Media. In COMM 402 with Dr. Michelle Holling, he thinks "it was the most challenging class [he] ever took [at CSUSM]. The class polished him

Kavlie Sadlon (2016) continues the trend of recent Communication graduates this past fall. She is working as an Associate Finance Coordinator for Golden State Consultants (GSC). As a company, GSC provides individualized finance consulting to local and national political candidates and organizations. Kaylie "work[s] very closely with different clients and campaigns like Kristin Gaspar for Board of Supervisors, Kevin Faulconer's nonprofit called One San Diego, the California Women's Leadership Association (CWLA) and CWLA Political Action Committee." For example, for CWLA - "[her] job specifically is handling all of the legislative materials for CWLA and CWLA PAC." She began working for GSC

Rhetorical Theory, with Dr. Michelle Holling, and COMM 300, with Dr. Michael Huspek. She believes "both classes push students to think differently of common communication practices, why people think the way they do, different ways to think of patterns, and why people communicate the way they do." She uses what she learned from courses completed at CSUSM to work with social media, and uses the "right rhetoric to tailor to" whoever she is communicating with. When working in a professional environment, often times many people do not know how to communicate effectively. Carlynn thinks her degree "has given [her] a way to better work with her coworkers." Ultimately, Carlynn thinks applying effective communicative strategies learned in the classroom has helped her the most with her iob. For undergraduates finishing up their degree and transitioning to the working world, Carlynn wants them to remember to push through and keep going. She encouraged, "you will be turned down a ton, and use the hard work in classes and apply it to the workplace. Be a lifelong learner, just because you're out of college does not mean you have to stop learning."

as a researcher and a writer." He thinks having developed research skills in his undergraduate studies was extremely beneficial at his current job. For Donovan, "finding research now is a walk in the park." In MASS 365 with Dr. Cecilia (Lia) Uy-Tioco, he learned everyday practices around social media and how to better utilize a variety of professional media platforms from LinkedIn, Instagram, text messaging, Facebook, and more. In a sales and recruiting environment, he implements what he has learned on a daily basis. In MASS 460 with Dr. Ashley Fogle, he learned how different corporations are built and consolidated, and how various political economic resources are implemented in different platforms. To obtain his new job, he utilized LinkedIn and sent out resumes to many employers. He obtained his current position with a combination of a references, networking, and LinkedIn. He believes his B.A. in Mass Media allows him to have a more innovative mindset. As he handles different situations at work, he is able to analyze those and understands they are not simply black and white. For undergraduates finishing up their degree transitioning to the working world after graduation, he wants them to remember "don't stress it! [Finding a job] just kind of happens. Be patient and also don't be too eager to have a job." Before accepting a new position, Donovan encourages students to know what a job will entail including its terms and conditions to potentially being avoid taken advantage of. He thinks his "internship with the Department of Communication prepared him well, and having a degree is the first half of the battle."

as an unpaid intern in June 2016. She worked during the primary election cycle and afterward was hired fulltime. Some of the classes she sees implemented in her political finance job are MASS 460, Political Economy of Mass Media; COMM 360, Mass Media and Society; COMM 465. Leadership and Social Change; and COMM 402, Approaches to Rhetorical Criticism. In MASS 460 with Dr. Ashley Fogle, Kaylie learned how to use communication in business settings, understand company profiles and read corporate finance. In COMM 402 with Lecturer Alexandra Jackson Nevis, Kaylie began to learn about rhetoric, communication with different audiences, and developed original scholarship on race entitled "A Film for Reparations: A Fantasy-Theme Criticism of Diango Unchained," which was accepted to the Undergraduate Scholars Research Conference February 2017. As she works in politics, she is required to have a lot of marketing, writing, public speaking, and rhetoric skills. She sees the skills she learned at CSUSM useful work. everv dav at For undergraduates finishing up their degree and transitioning to the working world after graduation, Kaylie thinks the most important to remember is that graduation is not a race. She says, "while competition is good and it pushes students to work hard, it is also a mental setback. If everyone worried about their own professional lives only, we las a whole] would be much more successful." Kaylie wants students to recognize that graduating after more than four years does not make undergraduates any less of a student. Kaylie accomplished her own goals in her own way, and still ended up successful.

GEO GIFT Recipient Terri Metzger Leaves Impact with "GEO Kicks Ass' and Other Key Lessons"

Terri Metzger was selected as the 2016-2017 winner of the Great Ideas for Teaching (GIFT) Award. The award was instituted in 2012 to promote individual reflection, peer learning, and visible acknowledgement of the innovative and effective teaching techniques faculty employ in GEO 102, General Education Oral Communication. In addition, the award provides formal and public recognition of influential and innovative teaching strategies specific to GEO. Recipients of the award receive a \$100 gift card and her/his name engraved on a plaque. Previous winners are visible at

As the recipient for this year's GIFT Award, lecturer Terri Metzger won for her innovative teaching strategy entitled "GEO Kicks Ass' and Other Key Lessons." The teaching strategy in her GEO 102 course occurs on the final day of class. Looking for a way to end the semester on a positive and celebratory note, she developed her classroom strategy to facilitate her students critically thought about what they learned in GEO and what they will take with them after completing the class. On the last day of class, she wants her students to recollect how they can take away something meaningful but also solidify lessons of the course. She has taught at CSUSM for the last 19 years, which provided her opportunities to fine tune her techniques. She asks her students to "work in small groups to identify key lessons they anticipate using in the future. This first part requires students to actively listen, evaluate and respond to the ideas posed by their group members and list the ideas on a large poster." The second task of the activity entails students to "travel around the room reading other groups' lists, evaluating and responding to them by marking the items on each list that they agree are key lessons." After engaging in the first two parts, the groups then return to their original group and collaboratively discuss items that were most popular. Many of the popular phrases that groups discuss are "how to be a credible speaker," "never wing your speech," "eye contact," "structure," and "practice is key." Metzger thinks the most common take away from her classroom activity is the discussion around intentionality. She seeks for her students to remember all that goes into the preparation of a speech and to apply similar practices in their everyday lives. Occasionally, the lists include general observations about students' experiences in the course, such as "GEO rocks!" or "GEO kicks ass" - each of which are positive outcomes to Metzger. She says, "a lot of decision making goes into speeches, especially about recognizing who [the students'] audience is. Putting the audience first and focusing on reaching the audience is the main goal." Students have to write papers, give speeches, and engage in various speaking opportunities in their future classes. She also believes that students' comprehension of outlining is always impactful following completion of GEO. Being an effective and succinct communicator is key and students from various majors all embrace this take away after GEO.

In prior years, Metzger adopted other recipients' practices of the GIFT Award and appreciated their teaching approaches.
