From Interstate 5

- From Interstate 5, merge onto eastbound Highway 78.
- Drive approximately 14 miles on eastbound Highway 78, then exit at Twin Oaks Valley Road.
- Turn right to go south on Twin Oaks Valley Road.
- After approximately .5 mile, turn left onto Craven Drive.
- You have now arrived at CSU San Marcos.

From Interstate 15

- From Interstate 15, merge onto westbound Highway 78.
- Drive approximately 4.5 miles on westbound Highway 78, then exit at Twin Oaks Valley Road.
- Turn left to go south on Twin Oaks Valley Road.
- After approximately .5 mile, turn left onto Craven Drive.
- You have now arrived at CSU San Marcos.

CAMPUS FACILITIES

The campus has more than one million square feet of facilities, all of which have been constructed since 1990. The primary academic facilities include a 200,000-square-foot library that opened in 2003 and can accommodate 840,000 volumes and seat 1,600 students, two science laboratory buildings, and classroom space for more than 7,000 students. Additionally, construction is underway on 106,000-square-foot Social and Behavioral Sciences Building due for completion in 2011 and a new Public Safety Building slated for completion in the spring of 2011.
