



New Temperature Screening Protocol for On-Campus Employees

With the health and safety of our entire campus community in mind, we want to share with you new temperature screening protocols for on-campus employees that will begin on Tuesday, May 19 in accordance with San Diego County public health orders.

Please note, this directive affects employees who are currently performing on-campus work and is not a call-back for other employees to return to campus.

Temperature measurement process

- Before you enter campus buildings, you must stop by a temperature measuring station, staffed by CSUSM employees who will have a no-touch thermometer.
- Please be prepared to provide your name, workplace location, and building access swipe card number.
- Employees cleared to work will receive a daily pass that must be visibly worn (lanyards to display the pass are available upon request!).
- Those with a temperature of 100°F or more will be prohibited from working onsite and advised to return home and notify their supervisor.

Where are temperature screenings held?

On-campus screening stations will be set up to accommodate the start times of scheduled essential employees.

- One station will be active from 6-7:30 a.m. at the University Services Building.
- A second station will be located at the Dome, next to the Campus Bookstore, from 7:30-10 a.m.
- Special arrangements for employees with third-shift or after-hours schedules will be made in consultation with the Department of Safety, Health & Sustainability (SHS)
- Additional screening times and/or locations may be made under certain special circumstances – please contact SHS at shs@csusm.edu to request.
- University Police Department and Student Health and Counseling Services employees will be screened at the Public Safety Building and SHCS Building, respectively.

Who is required to have a temperature check?

- Any CSUSM employee who has already been cleared to work on campus.
- Managers of employees who report to work but fail to be screened will be notified. Multiple violations of the screening process may result in an employee's building access being revoked.

We know this is an extra and potentially inconvenient step in your day, and we thank you in advance for ensuring that CSUSM is in alignment with county health orders so that we may continue to fulfill our mission in the best ways possible during this unusual and challenging time.
