

CSUSM BEGINNINGS

From humble beginnings as a chicken ranch, California State University San Marcos became a bold, innovative university with a forward focus. CSUSM opened a new era of public higher education in the United States when it was founded in 1989. Before its establishment, there had been no new comprehensive public universities built in the U.S. in two decades. Founded on principles of academic excellence and access, CSUSM welcomed its first students (448 juniors and seniors) in 1990. While the permanent campus was being constructed on the former site of the 304-acre Prohoroff Poultry Farm in the foothills of San Marcos, students attended class at a temporary storefront location. In those early semesters, students and employees nicknamed the university “Cal State Jerome’s” in a nod to its nearby neighbor, Jerome’s Furniture. Within two years, enrollment reached 1,700 students and the university moved to its permanent address on Twin Oaks Valley Road with the completion of Administrative Building, Academic Hall and Science Hall I. The center of campus was marked by the Founders Seal, which commemorates the 12 founding faculty who laid the groundwork to shape CSUSM with a bold vision that focused on community engagement and experience-based learning. That campus landmark has grown into one of CSUSM’s urban legends, suggesting that students who dare to walk on the seal will not graduate in four years. Three decades after its founding, CSUSM remains focused on social mobility, student success, diversity, inclusion, innovation and community-engaged learning. Today, CSUSM is home to more than 16,000 students and 55,000 proud alumni who are making an impact every day in the region and beyond.

CSUSM HISTORY


1990

President Bill W. Stacy and 12 founding faculty members lay the groundwork for CSUSM, its mission and its first nine majors. Construction begins on the permanent campus home.


1998

A generous donation from Bob and Ruth Mangrum helps build Mangrum Track and Field, home to two of the university's first sports – cross country and track & field.


2011

The Cougars add three new sports: volleyball, men's basketball, and women's basketball, bringing the total number of athletic teams to 13.


2016

The Sports Center becomes the first on-campus home court for the volleyball and basketball teams. Student enrollment tops 15,000 and the university's 37,000th graduate crosses the commencement stage. The first fight song is created.


2019

Ellen J. Neufeldt is appointed as the fourth president in the university's history.


1989

The 304-acre Prohoroff Poultry Farm in the foothills of San Marcos is purchased by the CSU to establish the first comprehensive U.S. university to be founded in two decades, and the 20th campus in the CSU system.


1991

Seven students are awarded the first Bachelor of Arts degrees.


2004

Kellogg Library – CSUSM's first freestanding library building – opens its doors.


2014

The doors open at the University Student Union (USU), which becomes the new hub of student life on campus.


2018

CSUSM makes history as the youngest public university to raise \$55 million in its first comprehensive fundraising campaign. The effort focused on preparing tomorrow's leaders, building great communities and solving critical issues.


2023

PAYING YOUR FEES

CASHIERS / STUDENT FINANCIAL SERVICES (SFS): FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

Where can I find a breakdown of Fees?

Go to our website: www.csusm.edu/sfs/tuition/

Can I pay before registering?

No—you must first register for courses. After registering, check your Student Center in MyCSUSM for a summary of charges. By clicking the Account Inquiry link, you can get a detail of all charges owed. Due dates can be reviewed by clicking the "Charges by Due Date" link.

Will I be sent a bill?

No, but you will be sent multiple deadline reminders. Monitor your account in your Student Center via MyCSUSM.

What happens if my payment is late?

In the absence of a "Course Drop Protection" indicator on your account, you will be dropped from ALL of your courses if FULL PAYMENT is not received by the payment deadline (below). There is NO grace period.

How does SFS communicate with students?

SFS uses your CSUSM e-mail address to communicate so please check it often.

Can my parents have access to my account to make a payment?

Yes—if you set up a parent pin number for them. Directions and the link to set it up are at <https://www.csusm.edu/sfs/parents/index.html>

Can my parents and/or family call with questions regarding my account?

Yes—If SFS has an authorization to release on file, granting access to financial data. Students can submit an authorization to release from their Student Center via MyCSUSM.

How do I receive a refund if my financial aid pays out more than my fees?

Refunds are processed automatically. To get your refund as quickly as possible, we strongly urge students to sign up for direct deposit in your Student Center via MyCSUSM.

When is the first payment due?

August 23, 2023 by 5 p.m.

 - upper-division BB, CC, DD
 3. *Major Requirements:*
 - must earn a C or higher in major and minor classes

BACHELOR'S DEGREE AT CSUSM

In addition to completing major requirements, all students must complete the General Education Requirements listed on the right. Depending on a student's major, these requirements may vary. Areas A-E general education courses are generally "lower division" (typically taken in the first and second year) and should be completed early in one's college career. STUDENT SUCCESS TIPS

Below you will find some strategies to help you navigate balancing school, work, family, friends, and future plans.

3 STEPS FOR EFFECTIVE TIME MANAGEMENT

Following these three steps may help guide you to use your time more effectively. As you go through the day, you should ask yourself, “What is the best use of my time right now?”

1 ORGANIZING

- › Better organization will help you use your time efficiently.
- › Every day, make a list of the things you need to get done so you don't forget.
- › List all items, not just homework; include your personal “to do's” as well.

2 PRIORITIZING

- › Now that you've made your list, highlight the most important items that need immediate attention.
- › Keep in mind deadlines and amount of time it takes to complete each task.
- › Indicate which items on your list can be delayed, if needed.

3 SCHEDULING

- › Create a weekly schedule that works for you; include your class schedule, personal appointments, work schedule, sleep, etc.
- › Include breaks, socializing, and room for flexibility.
- › Use a scheduling tool (planner, apps, calendar, etc).
- › Use both a monthly calendar and weekly calendar for short and long term planning.
- › Try out your schedule and make adjustments as needed – remember give yourself extra time to be flexible.

Utilize this Student Handbook-Planner, which includes important dates and directory information, to assist you in prioritizing course assignments and campus deadlines. UNIVERSITY POLICE DEPARTMENT

The University Police Department is open
24/7, 365 days a year.

The Police Department is assigned to protect students, staff, faculty and state property at Cal State San Marcos and the surrounding communities.
All police officers are POST certified.

University Police Department (UPD) offers programs that enhance student safety on campus as well as in their daily lives off campus.

Community Service Officer (CSO) – These employees are students at the University and work as the eyes and ears of UPD. They gain valuable experience in the field of law enforcement as well as help their fellow students,

Safety Escorts – A police officer or CSO will safely escort (by walking or by vehicle) any student to and from their vehicle, class or dorm room. This service is available 24 hours a day to campus locations.

Emergency Notification System – The Alertus Emergency Notification System, a public address system allows UPD to lock campus down in a matter of seconds and issues warnings to all computers, speaker phones and digital displays on campus. Additionally, email, text messages and phone calls are sent to all email addresses/phone numbers in the system.

EMERGENCY BUILDING EVACUATION TIPS

- › Dial 911
- › Try to remain calm
- › Give your name, location, and a description of the situation
- › Pull building fire alarm
- › Call out “Emergency, Please Evacuate the Building”
- › Assist anyone needing help
- › Check doors for smoke, heat and light
- › Never use elevators
- › Go to a designated evacuation site (150 feet away from buildings) to check in with emergency personnel
- › Do not return to an evacuated building unless directed to do so by emergency personnel

EVACUATION OF PERSONS WITH DISABILITIES

- › Students with disabilities should prepare for an emergency ahead of time by instructing a classmate or instructor on how to assist them in the event of an emergency
- › Evacuation chairs are located near a designated stairwell in buildings with levels that do not have direct ground-level access.
- › If an evacuation chair is unavailable, individuals with disabilities should remain near the stairwell landing for rescue personnel to arrive
- › Persons with visual impairments should learn the locations of exits and fire alarms in advance, if possible and seek assistance of others as required

CRIMES IN PROGRESS

- › Do not attempt to apprehend or confront suspects
- › Dial 911 to connect to the University Police. Be ready to give your name, location, and a description of the problem
- › Be a good witness. Note the suspect(s) appearance, details of the incidents, weapons seen and any vehicles involved
- › Try to remain calm

Dial 911 for emergency access to University Police 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, year-round. University Police and Community Service Officers (CSO’s) are available for safety escorts anywhere on campus. **For a safety escort, please call (760) 750-4567.** Safety Escorts are available 24 hours a day.

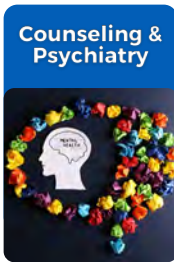

Changes in Rules and Policies

Although every effort has been made to assure the accuracy of the information in this publication, students and others should note that laws, rules, and policies change periodically and that these changes may alter the information contained in this publication. Changes may come in the form of statutes enacted by the Legislature, rules and policies adopted by the Board of Trustees of the California State University, by the Chancellor or designee of the California State University, by the President or designee of the campus, or by the County of San Diego & fluctuating health mandates related to the COVID-19 pandemic & accompanying mitigation efforts. It is not possible in a publication of this size to include all of the rules, policies and other information that pertain to students, the institution and the California State University. The most up-to-date or complete information may be obtained from the appropriate department, school, or administrative office.

Student Conduct Process

It is the responsibility of Student Conduct to uphold the CSU Standards for Student Conduct at CSUSM. We focus on working with students who have been referred to the Dean of Students Office for behavior that may have been a violation of the Standards for Student Conduct. Student Conduct ensures a safe and fair environment for students to reflect on their behaviors and discuss learning that has occurred. Students referred to the Dean of Students Office for alleged violations of the Standards for Student Conduct can expect a setting that fosters education while focusing on ethical development.

Student Conduct Process Learning Outcomes:

- Students will understand and articulate how their behavior and expectations outlined in the CSU Standards for Student Conduct may impact their educational career
- Students will articulate the reasoning behind the decisions made that led to a referral to the Dean of Students Office
- Students will understand and identify how their behavior has a larger impact on the CSUSM campus community
- Students will develop their ability to reflect on and learn from their behavior in order to make better decisions in the future
- Students will understand and articulate that the CSU Standards for Student Conduct support the health, safety, and overall wellbeing of the University community

As a member of the Cal State San Marcos community, all students are **expected** to adhere to the Standards for Student Conduct. The Standards for Student Conduct exist to maintain a **fair, safe, and healthy living learning environment** for Students, faculty, and staff. Students are also **expected** to be **good citizens, engage in responsible behavior, be civil to each other and positively contribute to university life.**

§ 41301. Standards for Student Conduct

(a) Campus Community Values

The University is committed to maintaining a safe and healthy living and learning environment for students, faculty, and staff. Each member of the campus community should choose behaviors that contribute toward this end. Students are expected to be good citizens and to engage in responsible behaviors that reflect well upon their university, to be civil to one another and to others in the campus community, and contribute positively to student and university life.

(b) Grounds for Student Discipline

Student behavior that is not consistent with the Student Conduct Code is addressed through an educational process that is designed to promote safety and good citizenship and, when necessary, impose appropriate consequences.

The following are the grounds upon which student discipline can be based:

(1) Dishonesty, including:

- (A) Cheating, plagiarism, or other forms of academic dishonesty that are intended to gain unfair academic advantage.
- (B) Furnishing false information to a University official, faculty member, or campus office.
- (C) Forgery, alteration, or misuse of a University document, key, or identification instrument.
- (D) Misrepresenting oneself to be an authorized agent of the University or one of its auxiliaries.

(2) Unauthorized entry into, presence in, use of, or misuse of University property.

(3) Willful, material and substantial disruption or obstruction of a University-related activity, or any on-campus activity.

(4) Participating in an activity that substantially and materially disrupts the normal operations of the University, or infringes on the rights of members of the University community.

(5) Willful, material and substantial obstruction of the free flow of pedestrian or other traffic, on or leading to campus property or an off-campus University related activity.

(6) Disorderly, lewd, indecent, or obscene behavior at a University related activity, or directed toward a member of the University community.

(7) Conduct that threatens or endangers the health or safety of any person within or related to the University community, including physical abuse, threats, intimidation, harassment, or sexual misconduct.

(8) Hazing, or conspiracy to haze. Hazing is defined as any method of initiation or pre-initiation into a student organization or student body, whether or not the organization or body is officially recognized by an educational institution, which is likely to cause serious bodily injury to any former, current, or prospective student of any school, community college, college, university or other educational institution in this state (Penal Code 245.6), and in addition, any act likely to cause physical harm, personal degradation or disgrace resulting in physical or mental harm, to any former, current, or prospective student of any school, community college, college, university or other educational institution. The term "hazing" does not include customary athletic events or school sanctioned events.

Neither the express or implied consent of a victim of hazing, nor the lack of active participation in a particular hazing incident is a defense. Apathy or acquiescence in the presence of hazing is not a neutral act, and is also a violation of this section.

(9) Use, possession, manufacture, or distribution of illegal drugs or drug-related paraphernalia, (except as expressly permitted by law and University regulations) or the misuse of legal pharmaceutical drugs.

(10) Use, possession, manufacture, or distribution of alcoholic beverages (except as expressly permitted by law and University regulations), or public intoxication while on campus or at a University related activity.

(11) Theft of property or services from the University community, or misappropriation of University resources.

(12) Unauthorized destruction, or damage to University property or other property in the University community.

(13) Possession or misuse of firearms or guns, replicas, ammunition, explosives, fireworks, knives, other weapons, or dangerous chemicals (without the prior authorization of the campus president) on campus or at a University related activity.

(14) Unauthorized recording, dissemination, or publication of academic presentations (including handwritten notes) for a commercial purpose.

(15) Misuse of computer facilities or resources, including:

(A) Unauthorized entry into a file, for any purpose.

(B) Unauthorized transfer of a file.

(C) Use of another's identification or password.

(D) Use of computing facilities, campus network, or other resources to interfere with the work of another member of the University community.

(E) Use of computing facilities and resources to send obscene or intimidating and abusive messages.

(F) Use of computing facilities and resources to interfere with normal University operations.

(G) Use of computing facilities and resources in violation of copyright laws.

(H) Violation of a campus computer use policy.

(16) Violation of any published University policy, rule, regulation or presidential order.

(17) Failure to comply with directions or, interference with, any University official or any public safety officer while acting in the performance of his/her duties.

(18) Any act chargeable as a violation of a federal, state, or local law that poses a substantial threat to the safety or wellbeing of members of the University community, to property within the University community or poses a significant threat of disruption or interference with University operations.

(19) Violation of the Student Conduct Procedures, including:

(A) Falsification, distortion, or misrepresentation of information related to a student discipline matter.

(B) Disruption or interference with the orderly progress of a student discipline proceeding.

(C) Initiation of a student discipline proceeding in bad faith.

(D) Attempting to discourage another from participating in the student discipline matter.

(E) Attempting to influence the impartiality of any participant in a student discipline matter.

(F) Verbal or physical harassment or intimidation of any participant in a student discipline matter.

(G) Failure to comply with the sanction(s) imposed under a student discipline proceeding.

(20) Encouraging, permitting, or assisting another to do any act that could subject him or her to discipline.

(c) Procedures for Enforcing This Code

The Chancellor shall adopt procedures to ensure students are afforded appropriate notice and an opportunity to be heard before the University imposes any sanction for a violation of the Student Conduct Code.

(d) Application of This Code

Sanctions for the conduct listed above can be imposed on applicants, enrolled students, students between academic terms, graduates awaiting degrees, and students who withdraw from school while a disciplinary matter is pending. Conduct that threatens the safety or security of the campus community, or substantially disrupts the functions or operation of the University is within the jurisdiction of this Article regardless of whether it occurs on or off campus. Nothing in this Code may conflict with Education Code Section 66301 that prohibits disciplinary action against students based on behavior protected by the First Amendment.

Note: Authority cited: Sections 66017, 66452, 66600, 69810, 89030, 89030.1 and 89035, Education Code. Reference: Sections 66450, 69813 et seq. and 89030, Education Code; and Section 245.6, Penal Code.

§ 41302. Disposition of Fees

The President of the campus may place on probation, suspend, or expel a student for one or more of the causes enumerated in Section 41301. No fees or tuition paid by or for such student for the semester, quarter, or summer session in which they are suspended or expelled shall be refunded. If the student is readmitted before the close of the semester, quarter, or summer session in which he or she is suspended, no additional tuition or fees shall be required of the student on account of the suspension.

§ 41302. Campus Emergency

During periods of campus emergency, as determined by the President or designee of the individual campus, the President may, after consultation with the Chancellor, place into immediate effect any emergency regulations, procedures, and other measures deemed necessary or appropriate to meet the emergency, safeguard persons and property, and maintain educational activities.

§ 41302. Interim Suspension

The President or designee may immediately impose an Interim Suspension in all cases in which there is reasonable cause to believe that separation of a Student is necessary to protect the personal safety of persons within the University community, University property and/or to ensure the maintenance of order. A student so placed on Interim Suspension shall be given prompt notice of charges and the opportunity for a hearing. The student may request a hearing on the validity of the continuation of the interim suspension and a hearing will be conducted within 10 working days of the request. During the period of Interim Suspension, the Student shall not, without prior written permission of the President or designated representative, enter any campus of the California State University. Violation of any condition of Interim Suspension shall be grounds for expulsion.

Academic Integrity

Each student shall maintain academic integrity in the conduct of their studies and other learning activities at CSUSM. The academic institution, and the quality of the education provided in its degree programs, are based on the principle of academic integrity.

The maintenance of academic integrity and quality education is the responsibility of each student within CSUSM and the California State University system. Academic misconduct in connection with an academic program at a campus is listed in Section 41301B, Title 5, California Code of Regulations, as an offense for which a student is placed on probation, suspended, or expelled. Students should consult their instructors for policy clarification if in doubt. In addition to advice from instructors, the University has multiple resources available including those from the Writing Center and University Library.

Students are responsible for the integrity of their actions, for maintaining the academic standards of the University, for promoting integrity, and for upholding the Academic Integrity Policy.

Definitions: Academic integrity is the practice of being honest and showing a consistent and uncompromising adherence to strong moral and ethical principles and values. Upholding academic integrity ensures the quality of scholarship and value of the education students receive. The following definitions of academic misconduct shall apply to all works submitted by a student, whether instruction is in-person, hybrid or any other modality. Such misconduct includes the following:

A. Cheating: Attempting to use, using, or contracting unauthorized materials, information, apps, websites, online groups, conversations, or study aids to gain an unfair advantage in any academic exercise.

Guidelines:

1. Faculty members are strongly encouraged to make every reasonable effort to foster honest academic integrity. This includes adequate communication of expectations about acceptable collaboration within the course for specific types of course requirements. Instructors should state in course syllabi their policies and procedures concerning the use of shared study aids, examination files, and other related materials or forms of assistance prior to and during examinations and other academic exercises.

2. Students completing any examination should assume that external assistance (e.g., books, online tools or services, tutoring services, secondary/multiple devices, group chats conducted on any platform, shared/individual notes, calculators, collaboration/communication with others in any modality) is prohibited unless specifically pre-authorized by the instructor.

- If a student is taking an examination from the same IP address or device as another student, it is recommended to notify the professor before the examination.

3. Students must not collaborate or share their work with each other or enlist other parties to prepare or contribute any work on their behalf without advance authorization from the instructor. This includes the services of any third-party, including websites and tutors.

B. Fabrication: Falsification, alteration or invention of any text, data, information, or citation in an academic exercise.

Guidelines:

1. Fabricated information may not be used in any class, laboratory experiment, or other academic exercise without authorization from the instructor (e.g., it would be improper to falsify data for an experiment instead of collecting the data properly, or to falsify results rather than conducting the appropriate analyses).

2. One must reference/acknowledge the actual source from which cited information was obtained. Fabrication includes making up a source as a citation in an assignment or citing a source one did not use.

3. A document or file may not be altered in an attempt to bypass or circumvent plagiarism detection software.

4. Graded academic work may not be altered with the intent to deceive the faculty member.

C. Facilitating Academic Misconduct: Helping or attempting to help another violate the Academic Integrity Policy.

Guidelines:

1. Students must not allow another student to copy or use papers, data, classwork, recordings, assignments, or examinations.

2. Students must not provide unauthorized information about a course to others.

3. Examination content shall not be shared or discussed with those that have not taken or completed the examination or while an examination is taking place.

D. Plagiarism: Representing the words, ideas, or work of another as one's own in any academic exercise.

Guidelines:

1. Plagiarism includes the act of incorporating the ideas, words, sentences, paragraphs, or parts thereof, or the specific substance of another's work, without providing the appropriate citation.

2. Plagiarism includes putting one's name as an author on a group project to which no contribution was made.

3. Plagiarism includes representing another's artistic/scholarly works such as musical compositions, computer programs, photographs, paintings, drawings, sculptures, or similar works as one's own.

4. Self-plagiarism includes submitting identical or similar versions of one's own work for more than one assignment or more than one class (including a repeated course) without prior approval from the course instructor.

E. Misrepresentation: Furnishing false academic information to a University official, faculty member, or campus office.

Guidelines:

1. Misrepresentation includes providing fraudulent transcripts, letters of recommendation, or other documents which may provide unfair academic advantages.






2. Misrepresentation includes taking an examination in place of another individual or asking or arranging for someone to take an examination as the intended individual student.

3. Misrepresentation includes falsifying and/or misstating the authorship of any submitted work.

4. Students must not provide CSUSM login credentials or other means of access to course content to a third-party to complete coursework on their behalf. This compromises the security of the CSUSM network and the privacy of student, staff, and faculty information. Students are reminded of the CSUSM Policy on Acceptable Use of Information Technology Resources of their username and credentials and could be in violation of both policies, if shared.

Sexual Misconduct and Discrimination, Harassment, and Retaliation Policy and Resources

The California State University (CSU) is committed to maintaining an inclusive community that values diversity and fosters tolerance and mutual respect. We embrace and encourage our community differences in Age, Disability (physical and mental), Gender (or sex), Gender Identity (including nonbinary and transgender), Gender Expression, Genetic Information, Marital Status, Medical Condition, Nationality, Race or Ethnicity (including color, caste or ancestry), Religion (or Religious Creed), Sexual Orientation, and Veteran or Military Status, and other characteristics that make our community unique. All Students and Employees have the right to participate fully in CSU programs, activities, and employment free from Discrimination, Harassment, Sexual Misconduct, Sexual Exploitation, Dating Violence, Domestic Violence, Stalking and Retaliation. The CSU prohibits Harassment of any kind, including Sexual Harassment, as well as Sexual Misconduct, Sexual Exploitation, Dating and Domestic Violence, and Stalking. Such behavior violates University policy and may also violate state or federal law.

The CSU prohibits:

Discrimination, including Harassment, because of any Protected Status: i.e., Age, Disability (physical and mental), Gender (or sex), Genetic Information, Gender Identity (including nonbinary and transgender), Gender Expression, Nationality, Marital Status, Medical Condition, Race or Ethnicity (including color, caste or ancestry), Religion (or Religious Creed), Sexual Orientation, sex stereotype, and Veteran or Military Status;

Retaliation for exercising rights under this policy, opposing Discrimination or Harassment because of a Protected Status, or for participating in any manner in any related investigation or proceeding;

Dating and Domestic Violence, and Stalking;

Sexual Misconduct of any kind, which includes sexual activity engaged in without Affirmative Consent; and,

Employees from entering into a consensual relationship with any Student over whom they exercises direct or otherwise significant academic, administrative, supervisory, evaluative, counseling, or extracurricular authority.

CSUSM's Notice of Non-Discrimination on the Basis of Gender or Sex

Reporting Options

The University's primary concern is the safety of its campus community members. The use of alcohol or drugs never makes the victim/survivor at fault for sexual misconduct. Moreover, victims/survivors should not be deterred from reporting incidents of sexual misconduct out of a concern that they might be disciplined for related violations of drug, alcohol or other University policies. Except in extreme circumstances, victims/survivors of sexual misconduct shall not be subject to discipline for related violations of University policy.

In addition, CSU policy prohibits retaliation against a person who reports sexual conduct (including domestic violence, dating violence, and stalking), or someone who assists someone with a report or participates in any manner in an investigation or resolution of a complaint.

Confidentiality—Know Your Options

We encourage victims/survivors of Sexual Misconduct, Dating or Domestic Violence, or Stalking to talk to someone about what happened- so they can get the support that they need. Before talking to a University employee, it is important to understand University policy relating to confidentiality and their obligation, if any, to report the incident to the Title IX Coordinator.

Most CSUSM employees (Faculty and Staff) are required to report all details of a sexual misconduct incident including the identities of both the victim/survivor and alleged perpetrator to the Title IX Coordinator or designee.

University Police Department employees may maintain the victim/survivor's identity as confidential, if requested by the victim/survivor.

Other CSUSM employees (Sexual Violence Advocate and Educator, clergy, physicians, professional mental health counselors and psychotherapists) may not report any information about an incident of Sexual Misconduct, Dating or Domestic Violence, or Stalking to anyone else at the University, including the Title IX Coordinator, without the victim's consent.

Confidential Reporting: Students can receive advocacy and support through Student Health and Counseling Services (SHCS), CSUSM's Sexual Violence Advocate and Educator, or off campus advocacy services.

** CONFIDENTIAL—except as noted by law, individuals in these locations are not required to report incidents of sexual misconduct to the Title IX Coordinator or designee without the consent of the victim/survivor.*

Criminal Reporting: Reporting to the University Police Department and/or local police is an option at any time following an incident. If students choose not to report to the police immediately, they can still make the report at a later time. However, with the passage of time, the ability to gather evidence to assist with criminal prosecution may be limited.

Students may also choose to obtain a protective or restraining order (such as a domestic violence restraining order or a civil harassment restraining order). Restraining orders must be obtained from a court in the jurisdiction where the incident occurred. Restraining orders can protect victims who have experienced or are reasonably in fear of sexual misconduct, including domestic violence, dating violence and stalking. CSUSM Sexual Violence Advocate and Educator can offer assistance with obtaining a protective or restraining order.

CSUSM's Title IX Coordinator (or designee) will also discuss with a student any reasonable interim remedies the University may offer prior to conclusion of an investigation or potential disciplinary action to reduce or eliminate negative impact on a student and provide them with available assistance. Examples include: Adjustment to University course work, course schedules, or supervisory reporting relationship; requiring the accused to move from or relocate within University housing; or prohibiting the accused from contacting the victim/survivor. These options may be available to a student whether or not they choose to report the sexual misconduct to University Police or law enforcement. The Title IX Coordinator remains available to assist you and provide you with reasonable remedies requested by you throughout the reporting, investigative, and disciplinary processes and thereafter. These remedies may also be sought confidentially, through our Sexual Violence Advocate and Educator, and Avery Bather.

Students are entitled to be accompanied to any related meeting or proceeding by an advisor of their choice. However, if they do not wish to participate in an investigation or hearing process, they have the right to decline to do so.

Non-Investigative reporting: A victim/survivor has the option to have a Sexual Assault Forensic Exam (SAFE) without filing a police report. On-Campus SHCS does not conduct SAFE exams, but can assist you in a referral to the appropriate off-campus location.

Important Definitions:

Domestic Violence is abuse committed against someone who is a current or former spouse; current or former cohabitant; someone with whom the Respondent has a child; someone with whom the Respondent has or had a dating or engagement relationship; or a person similarly situated under California domestic or family violence law. Cohabitant means two unrelated persons living together for a substantial period of time, resulting in some permanency of relationship. It does not include roommates who do not have a romantic, intimate, or sexual relationship. Factors that may determine whether persons are cohabiting include, but are not limited to: (1) sexual relations between the Parties while sharing the same living quarters; (2) sharing of income or expenses; (3) joint use or ownership of property; (4) whether the Parties hold themselves out as spouses; (5) the continuity of the relationship; and, (6) the length of the relationship. For purposes of this definition, “abuse” means intentionally or recklessly causing or attempting to cause bodily injury or placing another person in reasonable apprehension of imminent serious bodily injury to self or another.¹ Abuse does not include non-physical, emotional distress or injury.

Dating Violence is abuse committed by a person who is or has been in a social or dating relationship of a romantic or intimate nature with the victim.² This may include someone the victim just met; i.e., at a party, introduced through a friend, or on a social networking website. For purposes of this definition, “abuse” means intentionally or recklessly causing or attempting to cause bodily injury or placing another person in reasonable apprehension of imminent serious bodily injury self or another. Abuse does not include non-physical, emotional distress or injury.

Sexual Misconduct All sexual activity between members of the CSU community must be based on Affirmative Consent. Engaging in any sexual activity without first obtaining Affirmative Consent to the specific activity is Sexual Misconduct, whether or not the conduct violates any civil or criminal law.

Sexual activity includes, but is not limited to, kissing, touching intimate body parts, fondling, intercourse, penetration of any body part, and oral sex. Sexual Misconduct also includes, but is not limited to, the following conduct:

- an attempt, coupled with the ability, to commit a violent injury on the person of another because of that person's Gender or Sex,
- the intentional touching of another person's intimate body parts without Affirmative Consent,
- intentionally causing a person to touch the intimate body parts of another without Affirmative Consent,
- using a person's own intimate body part to intentionally touch another person's body without Affirmative Consent,
- any unwelcome physical sexual acts, such as unwelcome sexual touching,
- using physical force, violence, threat, or intimidation to engage in sexual activity,
- ignoring the objections of the other person to engage in sexual activity,
- causing the other person's incapacitation through the use of drugs or alcohol to engage in sexual activity,
- taking advantage of the other person's incapacitation to engage in sexual activity.
 - Intimate body part means the sexual organ, anus, groin, buttocks, or breasts of any person.
 - Sexual activity between a Minor (a person younger than 18 years old) and a person who is at least 18 and two years older than the Minor always constitutes Sexual Misconduct, even if there is Affirmative Consent to all sexual activity. The existence of Affirmative Consent and/or the type of sexual activity may be relevant to the determination of an appropriate Sanction.
 - Persons of all Genders, Gender Identities, Gender Expressions, and Sexual Orientations can be victims of these forms of Sexual Misconduct. Sexual Misconduct can be committed by an individual known to the victim including a person the Complainant may have just met, i.e., at a party, introduced through a friend, or on a social networking website.⁴ Acquaintance Rape is a form of Sexual Misconduct committed by an individual known to the victim. This includes a person the victim may have just met; i.e., at a party, introduced through a friend, or on a social networking website.

Stalking means engaging in a repeated Course of Conduct directed at a specific person that would cause a Reasonable Person to fear for the safety of self or other's safety or to suffer Substantial Emotional Distress.³ For purposes of this definition:

1. Course of Conduct means two or more acts, including but not limited to, acts in which the stalker directly, indirectly, or through Third Parties, by any action, method, device, or means, follows, monitors, observes, surveils, threatens, or communicates to or about a person, or interferes with a person's property;

2. Reasonable Person means a reasonable person under similar circumstances and with the same Protected Status(es) as the Complainant;

3. Substantial Emotional Distress means significant mental suffering or anguish that may, but does not necessarily require medical or other professional treatment or counseling.

Affirmative Consent must be voluntary, and given without coercion, force, threats, or intimidation.

It is the responsibility of each person involved in the sexual activity to ensure Affirmative Consent has been obtained from the other participant(s) prior to engaging in the sexual activity.

Affirmative Consent means an agreement to engage in sexual activity that is:

- Informed,
- Affirmative,
- Conscious,
- Voluntary, and
- Mutual.
- Lack of protest or resistance does not mean there is Affirmative Consent.
- Silence does not mean there is Affirmative Consent.
- The existence of a dating or social relationship between those involved, or the fact of past sexual activities between them, should never by itself be assumed to be an indicator of Affirmative Consent.
- A request for someone to use a condom or birth control does not, in and of itself, mean there is Affirmative Consent.
- Affirmative Consent can be withdrawn or revoked. Consent must be ongoing throughout a sexual activity and can be revoked at any time, including after sexual activity begins. Once consent is withdrawn or revoked, the sexual activity must stop immediately. Consent to one form of sexual activity (or one sexual act) does not constitute consent to other forms of sexual activity. Consent given to sexual activity on one occasion does not constitute consent on another occasion.

Incapacitation

Affirmative Consent cannot be given by a person who is incapacitated. A person is unable to consent when asleep, unconscious, or incapacitated due to the influence of drugs, alcohol, or medication so that the person could not understand the fact, nature, or extent of the sexual activity. A person is incapacitated if the person lacks the physical and/or mental ability to make informed, rational decisions. A person with a medical or mental disability may also lack the capacity to give consent.

Whether an intoxicated person (as a result of using alcohol or other drugs) is incapacitated depends on the extent to which the alcohol or other drugs impact the person's decision-making ability, awareness of consequences, and ability to make informed judgments. A person's own intoxication or incapacitation from drugs or alcohol does not diminish that person's responsibility to obtain Affirmative Consent before engaging in sexual activity.

Sexual activity with a minor (a person under 18 years old) is not consensual, because a minor is considered incapable of giving consent due to age.

It shall not be a valid excuse that a person affirmatively consented to the sexual activity if the Respondent knew or reasonably should have known that the person was unable to consent to the sexual activity under any of the following circumstances:

- The person was asleep or unconscious
- The person was incapacitated due to the influence of drugs, alcohol, or medication, so that the person could not understand the fact, nature, or extent of the sexual activity

- The person could not understand the fact, nature, or extent of the sexual activity, or was unable to communicate, due to a mental or physical condition

It shall not be a valid excuse that the Respondent believed that the person consented to the sexual activity under either of the following circumstances:

- The Respondent's belief in Affirmative Consent arose from the intoxication or recklessness of the Respondent;
- The Respondent did not take reasonable steps, in the circumstances known to the Respondent at the time, to ascertain whether the person affirmatively consented.

Sexual Harassment

Sexual Harassment means unwelcome verbal, nonverbal or physical conduct of a sexual nature that includes, but is not limited to, sexual advances, requests for sexual favors, offering employment benefits or giving preferential treatment in exchange for sexual favors, or indecent exposure, and any other conduct of a sexual nature where:

- a. Submission to, or rejection of, the conduct is explicitly or implicitly used as the basis for any decision affecting a Complainant's academic status or progress, or access to benefits and services, honors, programs, or activities available at or through the university; or
- b. Submission to, or rejection of, the conduct by the Complainant is explicitly or implicitly used as the basis for any decision affecting a term or condition of the Complainant's employment, or an employment decision; or
- c. The conduct is sufficiently severe, persistent, or pervasive that its effect, whether or not intended, could be considered by a reasonable person in the shoes of the Complainant, and is in fact considered by the Complainant, as limiting their ability to participate in or benefit from the services, activities or opportunities offered by the university; or
- d. The conduct is sufficiently severe, persistent, or pervasive that its effect, whether or not intended, could be considered by a reasonable person in the shoes of the Complainant, and is in fact considered by the Complainant, as creating an intimidating, hostile or offensive environment.

Sexual Harassment could include being forced to engage in unwanted sexual contact as a condition of membership in a student organization or in exchange for a raise or promotion; being subjected to video exploitation or a campaign of sexually explicit graffiti; or frequently being exposed to unwanted images of a sexual nature in a work environment, or in a classroom where the images are unrelated to the coursework.

Claiming that the conduct was not motivated by sexual desire is not a defense to a complaint of Sexual Harassment.

Sexual and/or romantic relationships between members of the campus community may begin as consensual, and may develop into situations that lead to Discrimination, Harassment, Retaliation, Sexual Misconduct, Dating or Domestic Violence, or Stalking subject to this Nondiscrimination Policy.

Sexual Exploitation

Sexual Exploitation means a person taking sexual advantage of another person for the benefit of anyone other than that person without that person's consent, including, but not limited to, any of the following acts:

- a. The prostituting of another person.
- b. The trafficking of another person, defined as the inducement of a person to perform a commercial sex act, or labor of services, through force, fraud, or coercion.
- c. The recording of images, including video or photograph, or audio of another person's sexual activity or intimate parts, without that person's consent.
- d. The distribution of images, including video or photographs, or audio of another person's sexual activity or intimate parts, if the individual distributing the images or audio knows or should have known that the person depicted in the images or audio did not consent to the disclosure.
- e. The viewing of another person's sexual activity or intimate parts, in a place where that other person would have a reasonable expectation of privacy, without that person's consent, for the purpose of arousing or gratifying sexual desire.

Prohibited Consensual Relationships

A Prohibited Consensual Relationship is a consensual sexual or romantic relationship between an Employee and any Student or Employee over whom they exercise direct or otherwise significant academic, administrative, supervisory, evaluative, counseling, or extracurricular authority.

Title IX Policies and Policies are subject to change Alcohol Use on Campus Policy

Excerpts from the California State University, San Marcos Alcohol Use on Campus policy are included below. To view the policy in its entirety, please refer to www.csusm.edu/policies/.

California State University San Marcos is committed to enforcing federal, state, and local and University regulations regarding the sale, service and use of alcohol. The purpose of this policy is to provide basic guidelines for the sale, serving, supply and consumption of alcoholic beverages on University property.

State & Municipal Laws & Regulations

It is the responsibility of both the server and consumer of alcoholic beverages to be aware of, and abide by, all State and local ordinances, whether specifically outlined in this policy or not. For reference, the most relevant sections of California and Municipal law are cited here:

It is against the law:

1. To sell, furnish, give, or cause to be sold, furnished, or given away any alcoholic beverage to a person under the age of 21, and no person under the age of 21 may purchase alcoholic beverages.
2. For a person under the age of 21 to possess alcoholic beverages on any street or highway or in any public place or any place open to the public.
3. To sell, furnish, or give away alcoholic beverages to an obviously intoxicated person.
4. To sell alcoholic beverages any place in the State without proper license from the State of California Department of Alcoholic Beverage Control (ABC).
5. To be in possession of an open alcohol container the California State University San Marcos Campus (other than as specified in this policy).

Alcohol Use in University Student Housing

Possession and consumption of alcoholic beverages in the apartment and everywhere in the community must be in full compliance with University, local, state and federal laws and regulations, and is limited to beer and wine. The possession of beer bongs, party balls, etc. is prohibited at any location on the premises. You are required to dispose of any alcoholic beverage that is present anywhere in the community in a manner that violates these rules and regulations or University, state, local or federal laws. Alcohol violations can result in the loss of your ability to reside in the community, but does not forfeit the financial obligations of the license agreement.

Alcohol: Bulk & Common Source Containers: Possession of bulk quantities of alcohol is prohibited. Bulk quantities include, but are not limited to: kegs, punch bowls, powdered alcohol, or any alcohol by volume equivalencies. Common source alcoholic beverage containers (e.g. kegs) are prohibited everywhere in the UVA, North Commons, and/or The QUAD.

Alcohol: Consumption in Public Spaces: Alcohol use and/or possession is not permitted in common areas (e.g., pool, stairwell, hallways, parking lots, and community building). Open containers containing any alcoholic beverage are not permitted anywhere within the community or outside of an apartment where all residents and guests are 21 years of age or older.

Alcohol: Consumption in the Presence of a Minor: Residents who are twenty-one (21) or older may possess no more than one six-pack of beer (72oz) and one bottle of wine (750mL) and/or consume alcohol in the resident's contracted bedroom space so long as they are following all other University policies. Residents who are twenty-one (21) or older must store open, sealed, or empty alcohol containers in their own contracted bedroom space and must dispose of or recycle empty alcohol containers regularly.

Alcohol: In the Presence of Alcohol Under the Age of 21: Students who are under 21 years of age may not be in the presence of alcohol. Students who are under the age of 21 are not permitted to store or display empty alcohol containers in their unit.

Alcohol: Possession or Consumption of Hard Alcohol: Regardless of age, possession, consumption, or service of hard alcohol is prohibited.

Alcohol: Possession / Consumption Under the Age of 21: Students who are under the age of 21 are not permitted to store or display empty alcohol containers in their common area of their apartment.

Drug-Free Campus Policy & Passage of Proposition 64

With the passage of Proposition 64 in November 2016, which legalized under state law the possession and use of marijuana by individuals 21 years of age or older in California, please note that possession and use of marijuana on the CSUSM campus or in campus-affiliated housing remains **against** University policy.

While now legal in California, possession of marijuana remains illegal under federal law. As an institution that receives federal funding from a variety of sources, including student financial aid and research grants, we are required to comply with the provisions of the Department of Education's Drug-Free Schools and Campuses Regulations, and the Drug Free Workplace Act, which prohibit the use of marijuana and other illegal drugs by students, employees or guests on campus.

As detailed in the policy, be aware that possession and/or use of marijuana or other prohibited drugs on campus or in campus-affiliated housing is prohibited and may result in disciplinary sanctions.

Smoke, Tobacco and Vape-Free Campus Policy

CSUSM Is a Smoke, Tobacco, and Vapor Free Campus.

Executive Order 1108 is the Policy on Systemwide Smoke and Tobacco Free Environment. This policy was created in order to provide the California State University's faculty, staff, students, guests and the public with campuses that support the principle of one's individual freedom to learn, teach, work, think and take part in their intellectual endeavors in a fulfilling, rewarding, safe and healthy environment.

CSUSM is a smoke, tobacco, and vapor free campus. "Smoke Free" means the use of cigarettes, pipes, cigars, and other "smoke" emanating products including e-cigarettes, vapor devices and other like products are prohibited on all University properties. "Tobacco Free" means the use of cigarettes, pipes, cigars, smokeless tobacco, snuffs, and other tobacco products are prohibited on all University properties.

Information about the Use of E-Cigarettes

As of March 2014, the existing smoking policy includes e-cigarettes. A few reasons for this change are the following: E-cigarettes can undermine campus policies by making enforcement confusing. 'Vaping' creates a dense mix of vapor and fine particles that looks like tobacco smoke. The 'smoky look' creates the confusion for adequate enforcement. E-cigarettes may pollute the air less than cigarettes, but they still pollute the air. Individuals are exposed to second-hand aerosol from e-cigarettes.

Currently FDA regulates cigarettes, cigarette tobacco, roll-your-own tobacco and smokeless tobacco. Proposed newly "deemed" products would include electronic cigarettes, cigars, pipe tobacco, certain dissolvables that are not "smokeless tobacco," gels, and waterpipe tobacco. Once the proposed rule becomes final, FDA will be able to use powerful regulatory tools, such as age restrictions and rigorous scientific review of new tobacco products and claims to reduce tobacco-related disease and death.

Post Proposition 64 FAQs for Students

Is marijuana allowed on campus?

No. CSU San Marcos, like most colleges and universities, are held to two federal laws, the Drug-Free Schools and Community Act and the Drug-Free Workplace Act. These laws say that in order to receive any federal funding (think work-study, financial aid, and federal research grants), the university must prohibit all illegal drugs. Since marijuana is still illegal under federal law, it remains an illegal substance to possess, sell or use on campus or at university related activities.

Failure to follow federal law would cause the university to jeopardize federal dollars that support students, colleges and programs. Also, CSU San Marcos is governed by policies set by the California State University Chancellor's office. The CSU Chancellor has also recognized the risk of federal funds being cut, and has made clear that marijuana policies are not going to change.

Am I permitted to have medicinal marijuana?

No. The Drug-Free Schools and Community Act and the Drug-Free Workplace Act do not distinguish medical and non-medical use. CSU San Marcos prohibits any marijuana use, regardless of medical status. This also applies to on-campus housing at the University Village Apartments (UVA), North Commons, and The QUAD.

Can I consume marijuana in my on-campus apartment at the UVA, North Commons, or QUAD, since it is my home?

No. As indicated in the Residential Education Rules and Policies, Federal law and University policies; unlawful possession, solicitation, procurement, sale, consumption, distribution or manufacturing of narcotics or controlled substances is prohibited. This includes, but is not limited to: consuming marijuana using vapor devices, growing marijuana in your apartment or room and consuming or possessing marijuana for medical purposes. Persons who violate this policy may be subject to disciplinary action, including immediate termination of license agreement. Please review the full policy on the Housing website.

Can I consume marijuana in my personal vehicle?

No. Smoking, vaping, and the use of marijuana and/or tobacco are prohibited in all vehicles (including personal and state-owned vehicles, whether parked or in motion), if the vehicle is located on campus property. Take a look at Proposition 64's regulation of marijuana use. You may find that it's still against State law to use marijuana in this manner (in public spaces).

Is vaping considered "using or smoking" marijuana?

Yes. Vaping and the use of marijuana in any form (including edibles and oils) is prohibited. Vaping is also against CSU San Marcos' Smoke & Tobacco-Free Policy. www.csusm.edu/smokefree/index.html

Summary of Personal Mobility Device Policy

It is the policy of California State University San Marcos to provide a safe environment for all students, employees, visitors, and guests by regulating the operation of personal mobility devices (PMD) on University property. By allowing the use of PMD devices as a mode of transportation, the University is encouraging community members to reduce its dependence on motor vehicles. This reduces traffic congestion, pollution, parking demand and the consumption of fossil fuels. This Policy addresses the use of Personal Mobility Devices (PMD) on the grounds of California State University, San Marcos and the property it controls.

For the purpose of this policy "Personal Mobility Device" (PMD) is any device upon which any person may ride and is propelled either solely or assisted by human power. These devices are otherwise commonly known as bicycles, unicycles, skateboards, roller/in-line skates, scooters, motor driven cycles of any kind, electronic personal assistive mobility devices, and motorized bicycles, scooters and skateboards, and other similar devices. Use of Social Security Number

Admission applicants are issued a nine-digit number which serves as their Student Identification Number for financial, records and student services transactions with the University. Their correct Social Security Numbers (taxpayer identification numbers) may be collected pursuant to the authority contained in Section 41201, Title 5, California Code of Regulations, and Section 6109 of the Internal Revenue Code (26 U.S.C. 6109). Use of a student's Social Security Number is limited by State and Federal laws. The University uses the Social Security Number to identify students and their records for purposes of financial aid eligibility and disbursement and the repayment of financial aid and other debts payable to the institution. The Internal Revenue Service (IRS) requires the University to file information returns that

include the student's Social Security Number and other information such as the amount paid for qualified tuition, related expenses and interest on educational loans. This information is used by the IRS to help determine whether a student, or a person claiming a student as a dependent, may take a credit or deduction to reduce Federal income taxes.

Privacy Rights of Students

The Federal Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) of 1974 (20 U.S.C. 1232g) and regulations adopted thereunder (34 C.F.R. 99) set out requirements designed to protect students' privacy in their records maintained by the University. The statute and regulations govern access to student records maintained by the University, and the release of such records. The law provides that the campus must give students access to records directly related to the student, and must also provide opportunity for a hearing to challenge such if the student claims they are inaccurate records on the grounds that they are inaccurate, misleading or otherwise inappropriate. The right to a hearing under this law does not include any right to challenge the appropriateness of a grade determined by the instructor. The law generally requires the institution to receive a student's written consent before releasing personally identifiable data about the student.

The campus is authorized under the Act to release "directory information" concerning students. "Directory information" may be defined by a campus to include the student's name, address, telephone listing, electronic mail address, photograph, date and place of birth, major field of study, participation in officially recognized activities and sports, weight and height of members of athletic teams, dates of attendance, degrees and awards received and the most recent previous educational agency or institution attended by the student.

CSUSM defines the following items as Directory Information:

- Student's name
- Campus e-mail address
- Major field of study
- Dates of attendance and degrees conferred
- Full-time or part-time status
- Degrees, awards, and honors received

Directory information as defined above is subject to release at any time, unless a student requests in writing that it be withheld. To make this request, students should complete the Authorization to Withhold Directory Info form, which is available on the Office of the Registrar website.

Adding a course or courses

During the first week of the semester, if a class shows as open (green on the class schedule) students may add the class in MyCSUSM and there is no need to "crash" to get a permission number. Beginning, the second week, a permission number is needed for enrollment in all classes. Permission numbers do not override restrictions, prerequisites or holds. Please refer to the current class schedule for detailed Add procedures. You may also visit Cougar Central (Administrative Building 3700) for assistance.

Dropping a course or courses

Students may drop a class on or before the add/drop deadline in MyCSUSM. If you drop ALL your courses in MyCSUSM, no academic record will be created for the semester, and may be subject to the prorated refund schedule.

Withdrawing from one or more courses

Students who wish to withdraw from one or more courses after the add/drop deadline should visit www.csusm.edu/enroll/services/withdrawal.html for updated policies and procedures. In addition, it is the student's responsibility to drop any unwanted courses during the add/drop period through self-service in MyCSUSM to avoid having a less than satisfactory grades (e.g., NC, WU, or F) reported on the official academic transcript. After the add/drop period, students may request a withdrawal. Please review the University Catalog or meet with your major advisor on the withdrawal policy and procedures. Administrative Drop

Instructors **may** administratively drop students who do not attend the first class meeting or have not met course requirements during the add/drop period. Students who wish to remain enrolled in a class, but are unable to attend

the first class session, are highly encouraged to contact the instructor the week before school begins to communicate reasons for missing the first class session, and to receive confirmation that space in the class will be retained.

Jeanne Clery Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Campus Crime Statistics Act

The Jeanne Clery Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Campus Crime Statistics Act (the Clery Act) is a consumer protection law that aims to provide transparency around campus crime policy and statistics. The Clery Act requires universities to:

- Collect, classify, and count specified crime reports and crime statistics
- Issue campus alerts: 1) timely warnings; and 2) emergency notifications
- Publish an Annual Security Report (ASR)

The Clery Director and Clery Compliance Team compiles the ASR which is a disclosure for the three most recent calendar years concerning the number of specific crimes that occurred on or within CSUSM's Clery geography. The procedures for preparing the annual disclosure of crime statistics include reporting statistics to the campus community obtained from the following sources: the CSUSM University Police Department, Dean of Students, Office of Residential Life, the Title IX office, Athletics, the Office of Human Resources, Faculty Affairs, individuals designated as "Campus Security Authorities" (CSA) under the Clery Act, and local law enforcement agencies with concurrent jurisdiction over the campus's Clery Geography. For statistical purposes, Clery crime statistics occurring on Clery Geography and reported to any of these sources are recorded in the calendar year the crime was reported.

All students and employees receive annual notice by campus wide email that informs them of the Annual Security Report, a brief description of its contents, information regarding the availability of the report on the campus website, the electronic address to access the report, and a statement on how to obtain a paper copy, if desired.

Firearms, Weapons or Destructive Devices

"It is the policy of California State University San Marcos to provide a safe environment for all students, employees, visitors, and guests by enforcing all laws pertaining to firearms, weapons, or destructive devices on campus. The restrictions pertaining to these devices are:

- It is a violation of Penal Code section 626.9 for any person, except as defined in Penal Code Section 12031, to bring or possess any firearm onto any property owned, controlled, or operated by the University without the prior written permission of the President or designee. This authority is delegated to the University Chief of Police.
- It is a violation of Penal Code section 626.10, with specific exceptions as noted within 626.10 of the Penal Code, for any person to bring or possess a dirk, dagger, ice pick, knife having a fixed blade longer than two and one half (2½) inches, stun gun or "Less Lethal Weapon" on any property owned, controlled, or operated by the University without prior written permission of the President or designee. This authority is delegated to the University Chief of Police.
 - A "Less Lethal Weapon" means any device that is designed to, or that has been converted to expel or propel less lethal ammunition by any action, mechanism, or process for the purpose of incapacitating, immobilizing, or stunning a human being through the infliction of any less than lethal impairment of physical condition, function, or senses, including physical pain or discomfort. It is not necessary that a weapon leave any lasting or permanent incapacitation, discomfort, pain, or other injury or disability in order to qualify as a less lethal weapon. Examples would include, but not limited to, BB guns, pellet guns, Airsoft guns, and paint ball guns.
- No person may openly display or expose any imitation firearm, as defined in Penal Code Section 12550, in a public place.
 - Arts 101 and Arts 111 are the only rooms approved for the use of imitation weapons and firearms for theatrical purposes. All imitation weapons and firearms for theatrical use will be provided by the Technical Director of the Department of Visual and Performing Arts. Any imitation weapon or firearm brought onto campus and not issued by the University is a violation of this policy. Any requests for an exception to this policy must be for educational purposes and must be approved one week in advance of the event in writing by the appropriate College Dean (or designee) and the Chief of Police.

- No person shall possess for any reason any fireworks, explosives or destructive devices as enumerated in the California Health and Safety Code without prior written permission of the President.
- No person shall possess any tear gas weapon to include Mace, CN gas, or CS Gas, pepper spray, or other similar gas weapon containing more than 2.5 ounces net weight of aerosol spray.
- No person shall possess any weapon enumerated in 12020 of the Penal Code, to include, but not limited to, billy clubs, metal or plastic knuckles, belt buckle knife, shurikins (AKA Chinese throwing stars), nunchaku, blackjack, sap, or any metal or replica practice hand grenade.
- It is a violation of Penal Code 653k to possess or keep in a vehicle a switch blade or gravity knife (A "butterfly knife" for example)."

Information about Hate Crimes

Introduction

The University Police wants you to know what a "hate crime" is and how to deal with this behavior. Every year, thousands of Americans are victims of hate crimes. Each one of these has a ripple effect in our community. The pain and injustice of such crimes tear at the fabric of our democratic society, creating fear and tension that ultimately affects us all.

What is a Hate Crime?

The term "Hate Crime" is defined by various federal and state laws. In the broadest sense, the term refers to an attack on an individual or his or her property (E.g., vandalism, arson, assault, murder) in which the victim is intently selected because of his or her actual or perceived race, color, religion, ancestry, national origin, disabilities, gender, gender identity or sexual orientation.

The California Supreme Court rules that hate crime enhancements can be properly charged if the prohibited bias was a substantial factor in the commission of the crime. The bias need not to be the only reason. (see in re M.S (1995) 10 Cal. 4th 698); People v. Superior Court (Aishman)(1995) 10 cal. 4th735

Also, the laws do not demand the victim be a member of a particular group, only that the defendants perceive the victim as belonging to the certain classification. For example, a suspect attacks a victim on the mistaken belief that the victim is from Iran, but the victim is Hispanic. Or, the defendant assaults a man he thinks is gay, but the victim, is heterosexual. Both of these cases would be a hate crime.

Are Hate Crime Laws Constitutional?

Yes. In Wisconsin v. Todd Mitchell (1993) 113 S. Ct.2194 the United States Supreme Court upheld the constitutionality of hate crime laws. The California hate crime laws in re M.S and People v. Superior Court (Asihman) above.

Difference between Protected Speech and Illegal Conduct

The First Amendment of the United States Constitution protects most verbal or written expression. Therefore, racial, sexual orientation or other derogatory slurs alone are not a crime. Dissemination of racist flyers, name-calling and other non-criminal conduct motivated by a person or group's status is often called a "bias-motivated incident."

The right of free speech is not absolute. In California, speech that threatens violence or physical harm to a specific person or group may constitute a crime. Depending on the circumstances and the words used, the conduct may be prosecuted as a misdemeanor or a felony.

What Can I Do To Help Myself?

As an individual you can support programs that create a climate in which prejudice and hate- motivated behaviors are not acceptable, and which also permits the expression of diverse viewpoints. Listed below are some prevention points:

- Do not escalate a volatile situation. If someone calls you derogatory names, no matter how angry or hurt you are, do not resort to physical violence. Otherwise, you may be the one prosecuted. However, if you are physically attacked, you have the right to defend yourself.
- If you are attacked or you witness an assault, try to note the assailant's physical characteristics, such as height, build, color of hair and eyes, clothing, and any other characteristics.

- Specifically, note any unusual traits, such as scars, tattoos, etc. Listen for voice characteristics, such as accents, speech pattern or the content of the assailant's statements.
- Report the incident immediately to police.

To help yourself in the aftermath of a hate crime, it is important to do at least some of these things:

- See a doctor to treat and document even minor physical injuries
- Take pictures of any physical injuries or damages to property, even if police already did so
- If the crime is vandalism, let the police see and photograph the damage before you clean and/or repair
- If possible, get witness' names, addresses, and telephone numbers
- Write down as many facts about the incident as you can, while it is fresh in your mind
- Seek counseling to assist with the emotional aspects of the attack
- Learn the names of the police officers and prosecutors who may be working on the case, and keep in touch with them
- If you feel that a police officer or the prosecutor is not taking your case seriously, or is in other words acting inappropriately, talk to your supervisor
- Get copies of police reports and check them for accuracy
- Inform the authorities of any threats, directed or indirected, and when in court tell the judge of possible fears
- At sentencing, tell the court about the crime, and how it has affected you and your family's life

If you find or received racist fliers, you should notify University police at (760) 750-4567. Watch for persons placing fliers on vehicles in parking areas. If you observe this activity call University Police. It is important to work together to create a positive environment. Hate crime prevention requires a partnership with the entire campus community as well as outside support from family, religious organizations and victim assistance groups.

COVID-19: Mitigation Measures and Guidelines

Directive

Unless stated otherwise, this Directive applies to all members of the University community on San Marcos and Temecula campuses, including faculty, staff, students, volunteers, contractors, vendors and visitors, when engaged in University academic, business or co-curricular programs and activities, whether on or off-campus. University auxiliary organizations are responsible for applying similar practices to their respective programs and activities. Exemption requests for persons with a medical condition, mental health condition, or disability that prevents wearing a face covering, and for persons who are hearing impaired or communicating with persons who are hearing impaired, where the ability to see the mouth is essential for communication, can be requested through Disability Support Services at 760-750-4905 or dss@csusm.edu.

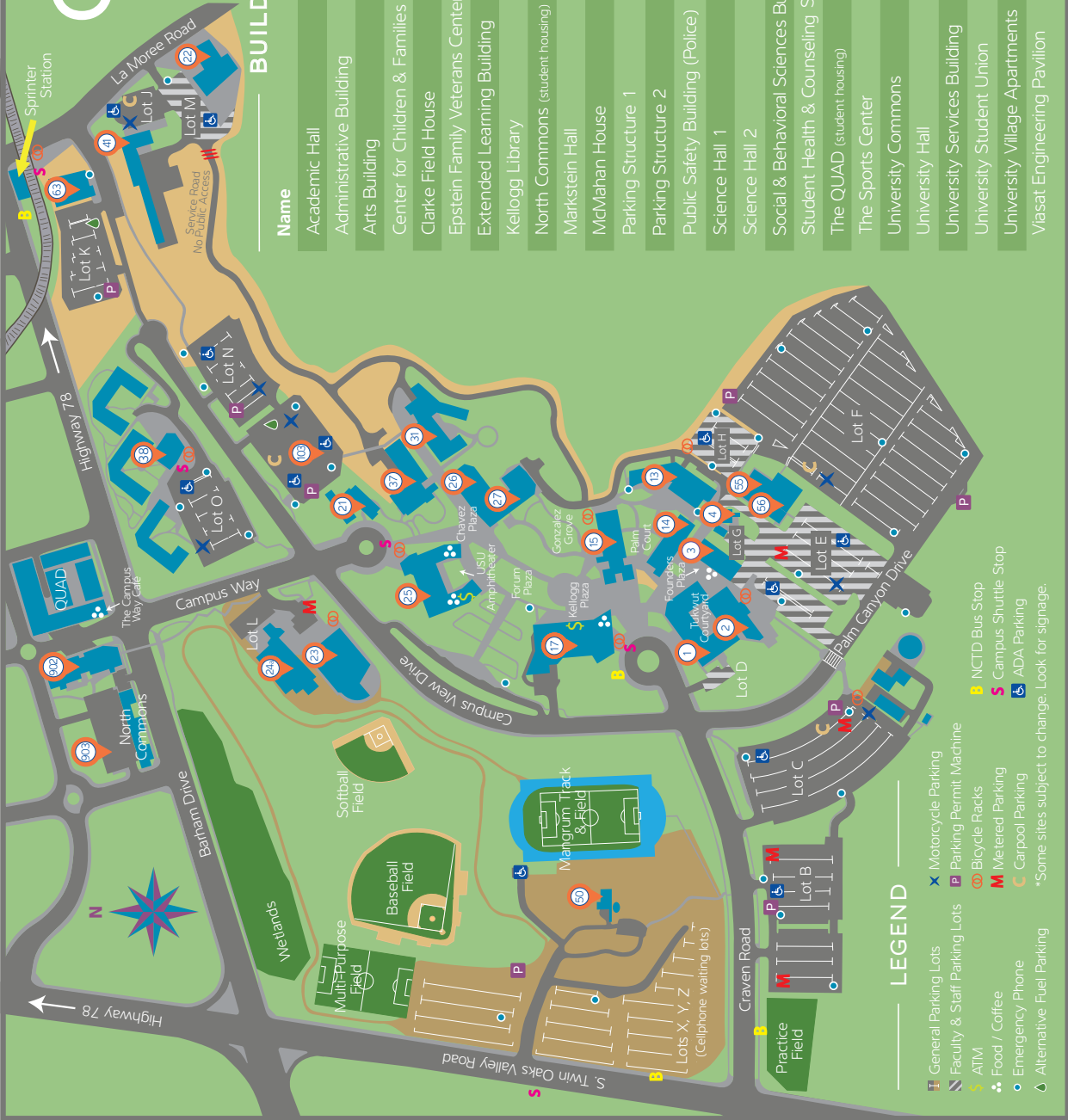
