Defendant: The person who is a accused of a crime and is "defending" himself or herself.	Plaintiff: The one who brings the complaint to court.
Appeal: If a defendant has lost in a criminal case, he/she may "appeal" by taking the case to the next level of the court structure.	<b>Issei</b> : Japanese people who have emigrated (moved ) to the U.S.
Nisei: The children of the Issei who are born in the United States	Beyond a reasonable doubt – After hearing all of the evidence in a trial, and using common sense, jurors must be practically positive of the guilt of a defendant before deciding on the verdict.

<b>Burden of Proof</b> – the defendant is "innocent" until proven guilty. The Plaintiff has the "burden" to prove the guilt of the defendant with clear evidence.
