

Freedom of Religion Free Exercise Clause

What applies in Cheema v Thompson?

Citizens may practice their religious beliefs, but remember....

1. A substantial burden must be involved if a complaint is made.

(The person with these beliefs will really suffer if they cannot continue this practice, they must be very sincere in their beliefs)

AND....

2. Compelling state interests must be considered.

(Government concerns must be investigated. is this safe for others, does this cause serious problems for citizens?)

AND.....

3. "Least restrictive" means must be used to solve the issue.

(The problem should be solved with as small amount of change as possible. Is there a way to solve this problem without breaking the rules of the religion?)
