A rhetorical device is a linguistic tool that employs a particular type of sentence structure, sound, or pattern of meaning in order to evoke a particular reaction from an audience.

Examples

Alliteration- I have heard how hedgehogs hog the hedge.

Cacophony- His fingers rapped and pounded the door, and his foot thumped against the floor.

Onomatopoeia- The bells went ding.

Hyperbole- His teeth were blinding white.

Personification- The car <u>danced</u> across the icy road.

Rhetorical Device	Definition	Purpose
Alliteration	The occurrence of the same letter or sound at the beginning of adjacent or closely connected words.	It creates a mood or rhythm in the text that enhances the pleasure of reading a literary piece. It makes reading and recitation of the poems attractive and appealing.
Cacophony	A harsh discordant mixture of sounds.	It is used as a tool to describe a discordant situation using discordant words. The use of such words allows readers to picture and feel the unpleasantness of the situation the writer has described through words.
Onomatopoeia	The formation of a word from a sound associated with what is name.	Helps readers to hear the sound of the words they reflect. Hence, the reader cannot help but enter the world created by the poet with the aid of these words.
Hyperbole	The use of exaggerated statements or claims not meant to be taken literally.	Will often be used to show contrast or catch the reader's attention. It also uses extreme exaggeration to make a point or show emphasis.
Personification	The attribution of a personal nature or human characteristics to something nonhuman, or the representation of an abstract quality in human form.	It can make descriptions of non-human entities more vivid, and can help readers understand , sympathize, or react emotionally to non-human characters.

Allusion	An expression designed to call something to mind without mentioning it explicitly; an indirect or passing reference.	It can be used as a straightforward device to enhance a text by providing further meaning , but it can also be used in a more complex sense to make an ironic comment on one thing by comparing it to something that is dissimilar.
